

THE BAPTIST CONFERENCE IN QUARTERLY SESSIONS.

The 71st Quarterly Conference of the United Baptists of P. E. I. convened with the church at Digby December 12th and 13th. The church building is nicely situated. From its situation a good view of the country is obtained, with scenery combining the beautiful and half-submerged. The opening services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. F. P. Dresser. A very interesting sermon was preached by Rev. A. A. Gates, Murray River, based on the words of Paul, Lord, what wilt thou have me to do? followed by an evangelistic service of much profit conducted by the Rev. Wm. M. Field, of Tryon. At ten o'clock, with the chairman present, Dea. N. J. McDonald of Montague presiding, the meeting was organized for business. The secretary, Pastor Field, read the minutes of the previous session and called the roll, 20 delegates responding. The reports from the churches showed good work had been accomplished, and the outlook was bright for further advancement. The regular committee was appointed for the work of the conference. The report of Deacon A. W. Sterns, Provincial Treasurer, covering a period of four and one-third months, showed that twelve churches have not contributed to the denominational work, and 15 churches had only contributed \$259.17. The discussion brought out the fact that present conditions were deplorable, as the various interests of the denomination depend on the regular, systematic contributions of the churches. The afternoon session commenced at 2.30 p.m. The first hour was given over to the W. M. A. S. Mrs. F. P. Dresser conducted the meeting and presented a paper on the work of the W. M. A. S. At 3.45 p.m. business of the conference was resumed. A feature of the session was the presentation of two papers. The Rev. Wm. M. Field's paper on, How shall we finance our churches? was full of suggestions to all the churches, especially to those depending on the H. M. Board. There is a reserve force in the churches which must be called out, and this can be accomplished best when we pray, and plan, and work for it, and cultivate the spirit of unity and a stronger interest in missions. Rev. A. A. Gates' paper on Every Christian an evangelist, was both stirring and excellent. The pastor and Sunday School teacher as evangelists came in for consideration in the discussion which followed. On motion a most hearty vote of thanks was extended to the writers, with a request for publication in full, in our Denominational paper. In the evening, the Rev. H. S. Erb preached a sermon on Eternity. The sermon was a stirring and clear presentation. At the close of an evangelistic service conducted by Pastor Field, several crosses for prayer. Although the roads and weather were unfavorable the delegates imparted the utmost enthusiasm. The proceedings were brought to a close by the congregation singing 'God be with you till we meet again.

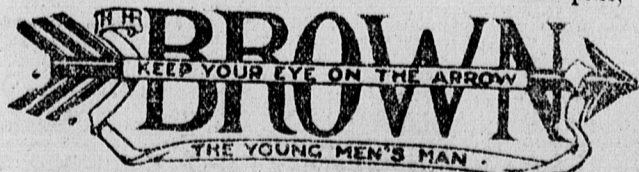
