MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Many Matters Discussed—Communications Received Relating to Various Subjects—Insurance Tax Stands—Tenders for Cement, Sand, Plank, etc.

The City Council met last night, all the Board being present except Councillor Rogers.

In reply to a question as to the care of trees, Councillor Alley stated that all trees that have been killed or destroyed will be replaced and other trees the property of the city will be attended to.

An application from A. Pickard & Co. as to removing the old weigh scale house at foot of Queen Street was referred to a committee.

With reference to a letter of protest from the Life Insurance agents against the tax of \$100 imposed by the City it was resolved to take no action and the amount of tax stands.

A letter was read from Hon. A. N. Belcourt, of Ottawa relating to the invitation to be extended to the King and Queen to visit Canada, and asking the co-operation of the Council.

In the matter of the redemption in 1915 of \$187,000 of Water Debentures, had not been carried out, therefore the amount levied by the present Council will not be sufficient to redeem the debentures when due.

A letter from the Water Commissioners was read, stating that the suggestions made to the Council by the Commissioners in March 1904, with reference to providing a sinking fund for the redemption in 1915 of \$187,000 of Water Debentures, had not been carried out.

The present Commissioners consider that in order to carry on the Waterworks Act it will be necessary to have \$6,500.

THE BEVERLEY HAS BEEN DELAYED

Charlottetown Trip Cancelled this Week—Freight, Passengers go via Pictou.

The Steamship Beverly, of the Plant Steamship Line, which was expected to arrive here this evening has been delayed on her trip from Boston and will only come as far as Halifax this trip.

The message contained the further information that freight and passengers would be sent on by way of Pictou, thence by rail to Halifax to connect with the Beverly which will leave Halifax at midnight tomorrow for Boston.

INTERVIEW WITH FRANK R. HEARTZ

Mr. Heartz returned on Saturday night from his annual spring visit to his ranch in Alberta. He found the boom still on, though just now in lesser degree.

There is, at present, somewhat of a lull in the influx of new arrivals. A number of settlers arrived early in the season in time to get in the crop.

There is considerable disappointment in the winter wheat district in consequence of the failure of some farmers to get their winter wheat in early last fall.

The day of cheap land within 100 miles of the railroad is past. Today, land in the High River district sells for \$18 to \$35 an acre which could be bought five years ago for from \$3 to \$4 an acre.

Mr. Heartz is at present negotiating for the sale of all his brood stock, and if he cannot carry out the present negotiations he will be obliged to send his entire herd of 2,500 head about 150 miles east of his present location for the summer.

Should he be able to sell 1,000 head of stock as he contemplates, he will be able to pasture the balance which will be steers and spade heifers, on his present ranch which contains about 8,000 acres.

Hitherto Mr. Heartz has given his attention entirely to ranching, but this spring he has put in about 300 acres of spring he at the time of his leaving oats, which at the time of his leaving were beginning to come up, and he is now preparing ground for 200 acres of fall wheat.

Mr. Heartz who is more less interested in farming in this province is in a position to compare and form a critic.

LOBSTER FISHERS \$100 A WEEK

PORT MAITLAND, N. S., May 12.—The fishing business of this town is in full swing. The deep sea fishermen have all launched their boats and crafts and have made some excellent catches.

The lobster fishermen are doing extra well here this season. One hundred dollars a week is considered small wages at present for a man. One man's catch a day during fine weather nets him at least \$20. Every fisherman from this port owns a gasoline boat, thus much hard labor is saved and better results accomplished.

JUDGMENTS OF SUPREME COURT

In Maritime Appeal Cases—House of Commons Wastes a Day—Fielding Says Insurance Commission's Report Will Be Too Late For Legislation This Session.

OTTAWA, May 14.—(Special)—Judgments in Maritime Provinces cases were this morning rendered by the Supreme Court.

St. George Pulp and Paper Co. vs. Rose; appeal dismissed with costs for reasons given in court below.

Leary vs. Town of North Sydney, appeal allowed. Judgment to be entered for plaintiff; judgment of trial judge to be carried; appellant to have costs in all.

In Yukon election case judgment was given confirming Dr. Thompson in his seat.

The House wasted the day in second hand talk.

Mr. Bennett's resolution recommending the adoption of the Transportation Commission's report was debated again and

some old talk rehearsed.

The Finance Minister told Mr. Lennox there would be an opportunity given for the discussion of Canadian insurance.

He had stated there might be legislation this session based on the Commission's report but it now appeared that the Commission would not finish the inquiry in time.

WIFE DREAMED OF HUSBAND'S CRIME

NEW YORK, May 14.—A special to the Tribune from Indianapolis says:—One year ago William Jones deserted his wife in this city, saying he was going to California. Mrs. Jones dreamed Saturday night that he had married another woman, and she was so impressed that she determined to visit Lafayette and see a man who friends told her greatly resembled her husband.

She found him to be her husband, living under the name of Smith and married to a wealthy woman. Jones was arrested. He pleaded guilty to an information charging him with bigamy and was sentenced today to prison.

COPPER, SILVER AND DIAMONDS

Rich Finds in New Ontario Include 400 lb Nugget Silver At Cobalt.

COBALT, Ont., May 14.—(Special)—Experiments just returned from the Judge Jumble copper mine fifty miles north of New Liskard in the unorganized territory declare this the greatest mining bonanza in New Ontario.

They report the discovery of a vein of copper ore 85 feet wide from wall rock to wall rock, and the samples brought down indicate one of the most sensational finds yet recorded.

One of the largest nuggets of silver ever taken out of the mine in Cobalt was that taken out of Larose mine Thursday at 215 feet level. It weighed 400 pounds.

The finding of two precious stones supposed to be diamonds in the blue clay formation at St. Mary's quarry near here has put the men employed there on the lookout for additional discoveries.
