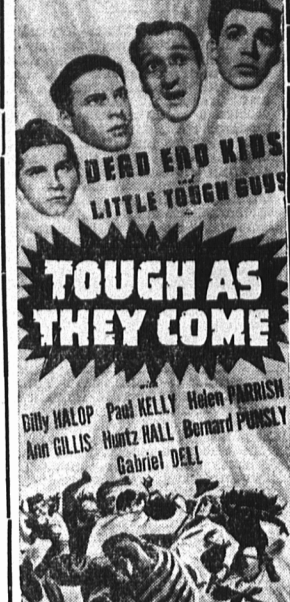

United Church W.M.S. Meet in Montague The Women's Missionary Society of the United Church in Montague held a thank offering service Sunday evening, August the thirtieth at 8.30. The members of the W. M. S. taking part were Mrs. E. H. Stewart, President; Mrs. L. B. Mellish; Mrs. M. L. MacLean, Mrs. Mrs. Leith Cowan, Mrs. George Gordon Hyndman, and Mrs. H. W. Davison. They based their remarks upon "The Bible in the World, To-day," talking as their text "The grass withereth, the flower fadeeth, but the word of our God shall stand forever."

The power of the Bible and the Christian life was illustrated by a story which was told by Dr. Robert McClure in an address given in Toronto last year. "The Chinese Red Cross needed three divisions of men to go to a section of Northern China where through disease, hardship, famine and other causes fifty per cent of the people died every year. Posters were placed in the cities, frankly stating the terrific risks and asking for their journey. We put that in because we did not dare to take any chances.

GIVEN JAIL SENTENCES - Four men, all of them residents in the vicinity of St. Peter's, were given various jail sentences yesterday by S. J. Magistrate Joseph MacDonald of King's County for assaulting a police officer. They were sentenced at Georgetown and will serve their time in the County Jail there. The charge arose out of an attack on the R.C.N.P. at a dance which took place at St. Peter's Friday night last. One man was given two months, a second 10 days, a third 45 days and the fourth, a soldier, 30 days.

FUNERAL YESTERDAY - The funeral of the late Mrs. Hugh McEwen was held yesterday afternoon from the residence of her brother, Alex Martin, 216 Sydney Street to St. Michael's Church, Curran Barr, where Requiem High Mass was sung by the pastor, Rev. K. MacPherson who also conducted services at the grave in the adjoining cemetery. Rev. Bernard Gillis, D. D., of Charlottetown assisted in the choir during the service. The pallbearers were: James Lamphier, Joseph MacKinnon, John F. Watts, George MacDonald, Edward Watts and William Alfred MacDonald.

INSTALL NEW STANDPIPES - Four neat concrete boxes recently placed at convenient distances across the city, have aroused the curiosity of many citizens. However, inquiries reveal that these are the modern standpipes which are to supply water to the city flusher. They replace the old standpipes with the overhanging arms and do the job of refilling much faster. The old method took 20 minutes to fill the flusher but these new boxes speed this up to three and one-half minutes. The work of installing the boxes was done under the supervision of Mr. G. M. MacPherson, mechanical superintendent of the department of Sewers and Water Supply. They are installed near the curb on the old Dominion Square, King Square, Brighton and Elm Avenue.

STUDENT BODY INCREASED - An increase of more than 30 students enrolled in Prince of Wales College this year as compared with last year was indicated by tentative figures released by Dr. G. D. Seal, principal of the institution, following the enrollment of the first year students yesterday afternoon. Approximately 513 registered for classes already this year and it is expected this figure will reach 520 before the term is completed. Last year 492 students enrolled for work in the various classes. There was a larger number of newcomers to the second year class than in usual because of the increase of Grade eleven students in other sections of the province. However, first year with 158 enrolled and second year with 250 registered showed a slight decrease over the 1940-41 term. On the other hand, third and fourth years showed a substantial increase. In fact third year almost doubled its enrollment this year with 80 reporting for classes against 41 last year.

LARGE SEIZURE - A large seizure was made by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police yesterday afternoon when they uncovered an illegal distilling plant in the woods at Afton Road. Two copper stills, 15 gallons capacity each, were found under an improvised tent in the woods one and one-half mile from the main road. There were also vats large enough to contain about 300 gallons of mash but actually containing 150 gallons, 50 feet of copper which was the "worm," two gas stoves and a quantity of other equipment used in the manufacture of "moonshine". A Kenzie, E.C.A.M.C. of Cogswell well-beaten path, leading from a certain house in the district, led to the spot. The tent covering the plant was made from a large canvas sail. The illegal distillery was still hot and police believe it had been in operation during the morning. The owners had also dug a well and had an up-to-date pump by the stills. This was one of the largest seizures at some time and it is expected prosecution will follow. Those taking part in the raid were: Cpl. N. A. Shaw, Constable S. W. Leard and Constable F. C. MacKinnon in Charlottetown Detachment, R.C.M.P.
