MEEK-PAYNTER WEDDING—The marriage of Elva Paynter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Everett Paynter of New London to Sgt. Henry Meek, son of Mr. and Mrs. B.P. Meek of French River was solemnized at the United Church Parsonage, Sussex, N.B., on March 24th. Capt. Rev. H.T. Jones performed the ceremony. The bride was attended in a powder blue dress and hat. The couple were attended by Cpl. and Mrs. I.L. Duggan of French River.

SERIOUS FIRE—Fire which broke out shortly after noon Sunday destroyed the large farm dwelling of Pius Sutherland, Cable Head East, about ten miles from the village of Saint Peter's. Most of the furniture and other contents of the building were also lost in the blaze. Although no estimate of the total damage could be ascertained, it is believed the loss would be in the vicinity of \$2,500 as the community.

FIRE DESTROYS DWELLING—Fire causing a loss estimated at \$2,500 which is one of the most serious fires in the district, destroyed the dwelling and furniture of Mr. Pius Sutherland, Cable Head East, recently. It is believed the fire, which started in the attic was caused by a defective flue. The house was about half a mile from the main road and not situated close to the nearest neighbor. The fire was beyond control when help arrived. Only a few small household items on the lower floor were saved.

RED CROSS headquarters announced yesterday that Prince Edward Island's total in the Red Cross collection had reached \$91,000 which is one of the highest percentages of the objective of \$50,000. Prince County's total including Summerside has now passed \$15,000. A number of districts have still to make final returns and it is now apparent that the Provincial total in the final result will be very close to \$100,000.

CAR FERRY MOVEMENTS—The car ferry S.S. "Prince Edward Island" completed nine round trips by midnight last night. The nine mile crossing was made in the average time of 50 minutes yesterday. Transported to the province on these trips were 48 cars of mixed freight and merchandise and 19 empty refrigerator cars. Three car loads of potatoes and turnips and 45 empty coal, box and tank cars were carried to the mainland. When crossings were completed all the freight and empties were cleared up both a Borden and Tormentine.

ADDRESSES ROTARY CLUB—Prof. W.J. Reid, fieldman in Prince County, was the provincial Department of Agriculture was the guest speaker at the regular meeting of the Charlottetown Rotary Club yesterday. Agricultural problems such as the increased use of the program laid before Canadian farmers and the acute farm labor shortage were dealt with in his address. Guests present at yesterday's meeting included, L.A.C. Frank Hillon, R.A.F., rotarian; James Lonergan, Montreal; John Giddings, Vancouver and Donald MacKinnon, M.L.A., Mt. Buehanan J.W. Boulter and A.B. Belcher were joint chairmen.

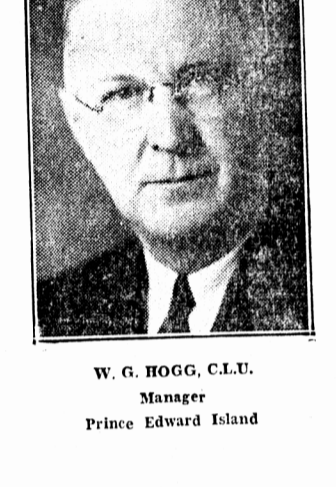

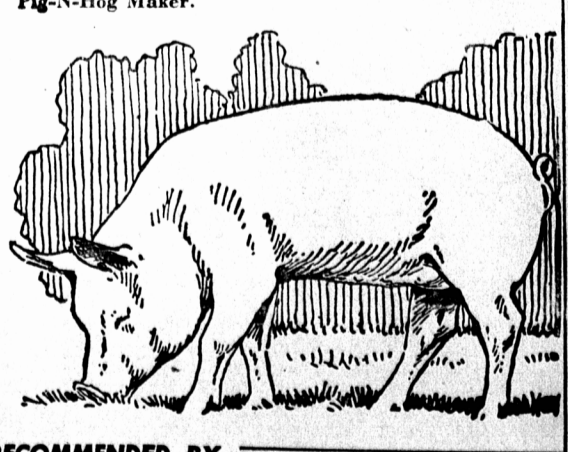
The meeting closed by singing the National Anthem.
