 On Friday morning, December 6th Mr. Hugh McLure, a lifelong resident of North Rustico passed on to that greater and higher life. Always a pleasant companion of both young and grown up he was always pleased to welcome all to his home, and it was always a pleasure to have been in his company. Being a younger son, on the death of his father, upon him devolved the duties of home maker to a widowed mother; which duties were ever faithfully fulfilled.

Mr. McLure was the last of a family of five, each of which attained an age many years over the allotted span. It may be truly said that Hugh McLure was the essence of honesty and uprightness. Always mindful of the trials and sorrows of others, he endeared himself to all and the pure memories of those left to mourn as well as neighbors and friends will be treasured as an example of that greatest attribute of man "one who fears God and loves his neighbor."

### LOUIS HOGAN

The community of Emyvale was severely shocked on Oct. 2 d w. a. r. the news flashed over the wires from Roxbury, Mass., that Louis Hogan, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Hogan, had met with a terrible accident which resulted in death twelve hours afterwards.

The deceased, who was a bricklayer, had been engaged at night work, in tearing down a brick building, upon the grounds of which a new post office was to be erected, when part of the building gave away. He saw the danger and would have escaped injury, had it not been for the fact, that in his way of escape he tripped upon a plank upon which he tripped and the debris catching him in the body and lower limbs, crushed them, almost to pulp. He was immediately taken to the General Relief Hospital, but it was found that his injuries were of so grave a nature, that nothing could be done, except to alleviate his intense suffering.

Louis, as he was familiarly known to his friends, left his home in Emyvale, when eighteen years of age, and went to Boston Mass. There he learned the art of brick-laying and followed the trade ever since. In 1924 he married Miss Rita Costello, daughter of Mr. Ephraim Costello, Elmwood, and became the father of three children, one of which was born and died two days after its father's death.

Deceased was of a pleasant and cheerful disposition, and was held in very high esteem by all his friends and associates. He was only twenty-four years of age, and it seemed hard to be called away in the flower of youth and in the midst of health and happiness but God in his infinite goodness does all things well, and as this earthly life is simply a preparation for the one Eternal, he saw that although only on the verge of manhood, he had finished his work, so took him to himself.

He was comforted in his final suffering by Rev. Joseph Lowery, S. J., who administered to him the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church and remained with him to the end. Father Lowery, in a letter of condolence, to his grief stricken parents gave a consoling account of his last hours, summing up his message with the words, "His death was beautiful."

There are left to mourn his wife, besides his sorrowing wife and two small children, his father and mother also two brothers and nine sisters. His remains arrived at North Wiltshire, on Oct. 4th, and were taken to the home of his parents where they lay till the following morning. The funeral took place to St. Ann's Church, where Requiem High Mass for the repose of his soul was sung by Rev. Father Herrell, P. P. 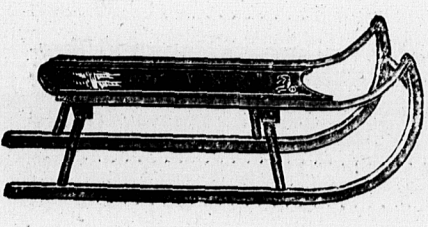
