Pembroke Lumber Kings Outplay Maritime Champs To Win Series Opener 9-4

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONCTON, N. B., March 19.—Sharp-shooting Roy Giesebrecht led Pembroke Lumber Kings to a 9-4 victory over Amherst Canucks to-night in the opener of a two-game total goal eastern series of the Memorial Cup playdowns.

Considered one of the smartest juniors developed in the Ottawa Valley for many a year, the fair-haired Pembroke centre shot four goals and assisted on two others, displaying dazzling speed that disorganized the Maritime champions.

Amherst's sensational Ripley-Ripley-Lowther front line broke through dangerously many times but their thrusts met a tough Pembroke defence and little hope was held for wiping out the five-goal deficit in the second game Saturday night.

Marliners Outplayed About 1,200 fans turned out in a drizzling rain and springlike temperatures to witness the engagement. They saw a team of youngsters from Pembroke out-play the Marliners in the finer points of the game, scoring four goals in the first period, three in the second and complete their evening's work with a pair of markers in the third.

Man for man the young Canucks from Amherst just about matched the Ontarians, but the little Lumber Kings knew too much hockey for them, and while the series is not yet over, Dave Behan's team will go into the final engagement top-heavy favorites.

Paced by the brilliant playing of Monde Roy Giesebrecht, who scored four goals himself and assisted in two others, the Pembroke kids took the lead late in the first period and were never headed thereafter. Amherst fought back furiously all the way but they got in their most effective work in the first period. The defence pair of Elmer Fraser and Courtney Chapman checked hard and broke up numerous Pembroke sorties by lateral use of the body.

Canucks Falter However, as the game wore on, the Canucks faltered in their defensive department and Messrs. Giesebrecht and company were allowed plenty of lee-way in opened scoring opportunities.

Amherst opened the scoring when Elmer Fraser fired the first salute to the cheers of the Maritime fans. Less than three minutes later however, Giesebrecht evened the score.

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BRADENTON, Fla., March 19.—The St. Louis Cardinal management greeted Jerome H. Dean, age pitcher, like a long-lost son today and "Ole Dix" was visibly touched to the extent of signing a pledge of loyalty and obedience.

Such mundane matters as salary terms—Dizzy wants \$40,000 a year and the Cardinals have offered \$18,500—obviously were out of place at the fellowship gathering at a hotel here and vice president Branch Rickey delicately suggested a discussion of terms be put off until tomorrow.

As Rickey explained, there was more than a question of pay involved—the club wanted to be sure Dizzy would be a good Cardinal and pitcher when he was told to any catcher selected by Manager Frankie Frisch.

While "Ole Dix" was in the middle of protesting his love for the team, the boss' and all the players, the subject of catcher Virgil Davis was brought up. Davis, reported to have been angry because of remarks attributed to Dean, was no one on the list of those quoted as saying they wanted to punch Dizzy on the nose.

Gallantly Dean arose to the occasion. He suggested that Davis be called into the conference. In came the bulky catcher, smiling. Dizzy met him with a grin. They shook hands and announced everything was hunky-dory.

Then the voluble Dean said he wanted "to put it in writing." To Rickey he dictated: "Give me a ball and a glove and put Davis behind the plate and I'll pitch to him. We're out to win the pennant."

Highlights of Tonight's Skating Programme (C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, March 19.—Boston Bruins won third position in the National Hockey League's American section here tonight by tying Toronto Maple Leafs 2-2 in a game that had all the thrills of a play-off.

The point left Leafs a slender chance at the Canadian division leadership, enabling them to win if they defeat New York Americans Saturday and Chicago beats Montreal Maroons.

After beating the Toronto defence repeatedly in the first period, Boston took a lead in the second through Cooney Weiland's goal on a pass from Red Beattie. Bruins held the advantage only six minutes before Harvey Jackson scored in a gangling attack while Peggy O'Neil and Babe Siebert were serving penalties, both for tripping Pep Kelly.

Charles Conacher gave Toronto a lead in the third minute of the third period on a typical Toronto gang play. Parked at the blue line, the big right winger took a pass from Happy Day after the Toronto defenceman had snared a Bob Davidson pass. He drove a shot that "Tiny" Thompson probably never saw. It went into the net with his.

Less than four minutes later Paul Runge took a pass from Dit Clapper, broke away from a flock of Leafs and rode in on George Hainsworth pretty much as he wished. The overtime was content with Boston seemingly picking up the ice every chance they had.

The tie for Boston tossed Rangers out of the playoffs for the first time since they entered the league in 1926. Even if they defeat Boston on Sunday night in Boston, the Bruins will win out through a better win total.

DETROIT, March 19.—(A. P.)—Detroit Red Wings clinched the American division leadership in the National Hockey League tonight with a brilliant 5-3 victory over Chicago Black Hawks, their nearest rivals.
