The waiter who had hesitated when Pruett spoke, happened to glance at Duke, who quickly shook his head.

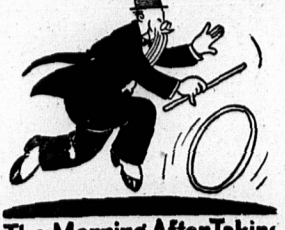
on the table. It was clenched tight. He was afraid she would speak—would say that she had not voiced her opinion. Luckily it was Madison who spoke.
