## NEW ROUTE FOR GRAIN.

Syndicate Plans to Carry Export Cereals to Montreal.

William J. Conners of Buffalo, dock contractor, newspaper owner, and politician, was in Chicago Sunday looking after a project in which he has interested Chicago, Duluth, Cleveland, Buffalo, and Montreal capital for an all water route for grain to the seaboard. Montreal is to be the seaboard terminal of the route, and Mr. Conner's recently obtained concessions from the Harbor commission of Montreal, with the approval of the Minister of Public Works, for the erection of three elevators with an aggregate capacity of 9,000,000 bushels, and large double-decked warehouses.

With these elevators and warehouses there is to be a fleet of thoroughly modern steamers, contracts for the building of twenty-one of which are to be let within a short time, providing the present plans of organization are completed successively, as Mr. Conners is confident they will be. The vessels will be 240 feet in length, 33 feet beam, and will draw fourteen feet of water through the canals. They will have a carrying capacity of 100,000 bushels of corn. Through the open water months they will be engaged for the greater part in carrying grain from the various lake ports in Montreal, but in winter they will be employed both in coast trade, and in carrying grain to Liverpool, for which they will be adapted.

### ELEVATOR AT PORT COLBORNE.

"Besides the three elevators at Montreal we expect to build an elevator of 1,500,000 bushels in capacity at Port Colborne, Ont., sixteen miles from Buffalo, and through grain going to Montreal in large cargoes will be broken there.

"During the season just ended only a little more than 21,000,000 bushels of the vast amount of grain which came to Buffalo from the West by lake and rail was shipped East by the Erie Canal. The great bulk of it went by rail.

"It will be the seaports that will suffer from the new route, New York, Newport News, Boston, Baltimore, Portland, Galveston, and every port through which grain passes for export. It will imply be a contest between rail and water, and I am confident water will win."

### KRUGER'S MALADY.

## HALIFAX MARKETS

Competition with P. E. I. Keeps Down

### ONTARIO ARTICLE PRICE

The Mild Weather also Assists in The Lowering of Prices.

HALIFAX, Dec. 15.—The cheese men of Nova Scotia have been making money this season. The price is high and soon it will be higher. With the exception of the Antigonish factories, where some 150 cheeses are still held, the cheese output of Nova Scotia and indeed of the maritime provinces, is in the hands of dealers. Jobbers are asking 124 cents, and as already stated the chances are that soon it will be higher.

Butter prices, too, are considerably higher than at this time last year, and there has been some stiffening within the past few days. Nova Scotia dairy tubs are scarce and the price ranges from 16c to 18c.

The soft weather and large imports of pork from Prince Edward Island, have a tendency to keep down prices of that commodity and the figures stand at 44 to 54c for light and heavy. Beef is unchanged. Fowls sell at 30c to 40c, but next week the price may advance, though what the immediate future will bring cannot be predicted. There is sure to be a heavy demand and while enlarged supply may prevent an advance there will be no decline.

Canadian oats, in bags, are quoted at 37c to 38c, while P. E. Island oats in bulk sell at 35c to 37c. It is the competition from P. E. Island that keeps down the price of the Ontario article. Potatoes from P. E. Island are selling at 26c to 28c. Nova Scotia potatoes are only nominally on the market, the cheaper Island goods controlling the situation.

Turnips sell ex vessel at 25c. Carrots at 50c to 55c, and parsnips at the same figures. Cabbage are scarce, selling ex vessel at 60c per doz.

Flour and feed are unchanged. Stocks of the former are about average in quantity, and a fair amount of business is doing. Quotations of the chief commodities are as follows:  
Potatoes, P. E. I., per bushel, 26 to 28c  
Eggs, per case per doz., 18c  
Cheese 124c  
Oats, bagged, 37 to 38c  
Do, P. E. I., in bulk 25 to 37c

### Christmas Plum Pudding.

Seed first one pound of raisins, when preparing to make Christmas plum pudding; mix with them a pound of currants and half a pound minced orange peel; dust over a quarter of a pound of flour. Chop fine one pound of suet; add to it a quarter of a pound of brown sugar, half a nutmeg, grated, three-quarters of a pound of stale, dry bread-crumbs. Mix all the ingredients together. Beat five eggs, without separating, until light; add to them half a pint of grapes or orange juice; pour over the dry ingredients and mix thoroughly.

The mixture should not be wet, but each particle should be moistened. Pack this into small greased kettles or molds. It will fill two three-pound kettles. Put on the covers, stand the molds in the steamer, and steam steadily for ten hours. The easier way is to get the ingredients ready the night before, mix and put them on early in the morning, allowing them to cook all day. Take them from the steamer, remove the lids of the kettles or molds, and allow the puddings to cool; then replace the lids and put the puddings away. They will keep in a cool place for several months or a year.—Ladies Home Journal.
