SAD ACCIDENT AT CENTREVILLE

CENTREVILLE, March 18.—The incidents in connection with the accident which befell Vincent Conroy at Centreville last Sunday are extremely pathetic in some senses than one. The horse had for years been looked upon as almost a friend of the family and was especially loved by the little lad, from whose hand he would eat tempting morsels, and follow him like a dog. At one time the father thought of parting with the creature but Vincent begged so hard for his dumb friend, that his request was finally granted. On the day of the accident the old boys were driving a beautiful span of Clydesdales, and to please their young brother—who by the way was the pet of all who knew him—allowed him to drive behind them with the old horse. After a time the older boys looking round noticed that something had happened to Vincent, and finding him to be unconscious could only arrive at the conclusion that he must have been kicked. He was at once taken to his home and Dr. Ballem, a nearby physician immediately summoned. In a few minutes he was on the spot and for the time being saved the victim's life. Being anxious concerning his patient, the surgeon held a consultation with Dr. Alex. McNutt, and eventually Dr. R. J. Ledwith of this City reached the sorrowing home, and performed a most difficult operation upon the skull, removing the broken fragments and pressure on the brain. This operation is the first of its kind ever performed on the Island as far as can be ascertained, and if the child, under the care of trained nurses, and anxiously watched night and day by loving parents, recovers, it will be a triumph, not only to P. E. I. but to world-wide modern surgery.
