The Stanley arrived here yesterday from Picton at 10.30, with 21 passengers, 60 bags mail, and some horses for Willard Kitcher, contractor. The Princess made a trip to Picton and returned yesterday, and the Northumberland succeeded in making a return trip between Summerside and Point du Chene.

EXTENSIVE improvements are to be undertaken in Grace Church Building. Some twenty feet of the eastern end of the building has been partitioned off from the rest of the interior of the church. This space is to be fitted up as a cosy comfortable class room. The main entrance will be changed to the south side of the building. The class room will be about 21x33 feet and will be affording by a proper platform at the north end of the class room will be afforded by an addition to be made to the main building. A stair case is planned and the library will be upstairs. None of the up-stairs rooms will be changed. The class room and the church will connect by a large folding door. The improvement will furnish a much needed room for social and school purposes. The work is being carried out by Henry Rackham, whose ability as a contractor is well known. The church and parsonage will be painted by D. Howlett as soon as alterations are done.

THE following occurrence is one which The Guardian has several times been requested to republish. It is copied from an Island newspaper. On the 16th January, 1855, Thomas Robins, Jr and sisters Ann and Mary with a Miss Johnston from Margate Road were on a visit to a Mr. Proctor's at Green's Shore, Summerside. They left at about half past eight o'clock on Tuesday evening to return home to Beleque. At the time of their leaving the shore it was snowing a little, and they lost the track and drove out towards the harbor; the young man got out of the sleigh and was leading the horse by the bridle, when he suddenly walked into an opening in the ice, the sleigh upset and they were thrown into the water. Mr. Robins thinks they were in the water for half an hour before any of them got out, the first who succeeded in getting on the ice, and then got his two sisters out, tried hard to save Miss Johnston, but before he could reach her she sank out of sight, to rise no more. They then started for the shore, not knowing where they were going and when they had walked about two miles, Ann Robins was unable to walk further and they were compelled to leave her on the ice. They saw a light in some of the houses at the wharf, and reached Green's Shore. Mary being unable to walk her brother had to procure assistance to convey her to a house.—This was at 12 p. m. An alarm was raised and sixty men proceeded in search of the other sister but were unable to discover the body till after daylight on Wednesday morning, when it was found frozen to death, also the body of Miss Johnston, floating in the water close to the sleigh. Mary Robins is badly frozen but not dangerously.
