Mr. Cook was formerly wireless operator on the C. G. S. Minto and later occupied the same position on the C. G. S. Earl Grey. His duties brought him in contact with many Islanders and hundreds of travellers, with all of whom he was greatly esteemed for his courteous and genial manner. A message received by the Marine Department here stated that his death occurred on board the Montcalm and that the body was taken to Quebec. Deceased was a native of England and was married to a Miss Hilchey, of Georgetown, who with several children survive him and are at present living in Truro, N. S.

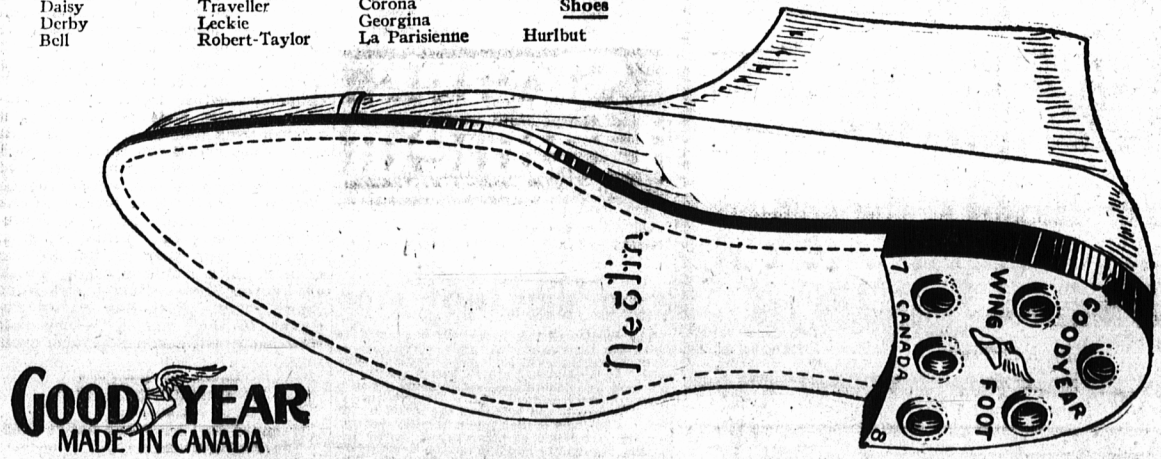

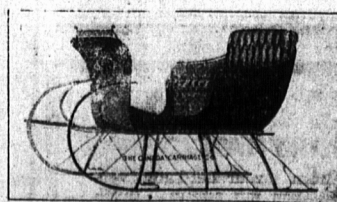
