DOMESTIC EGG

The poultry market presently is not very active. It is felt that the 1948 crop of poultry has been marketed. Poultry producers are paying for the graded pack including new cases and trays AL 51, AM 49, AP 44, B 44, C 33. The five or six cent spread between the price the producer receives and the price paid for the graded pack is justified. The new case and trays cost approximately three cents per dozen only leaving the operator two cents per dozen for cost of grading and upkeep of plant.

Wholesalers are quoting retailers for the graded cartoned pack AL 56-7, AM 54-5, AP 47-50, B50. Eggs are retailing to consumers in cartons AL 65-8, AM 63-5, B loose 35. Many enquiries are received at this office from consumers as to prices and quality. Consumers will save on purchase and be assured of quality if they ask for eggs by grade—buy by grade and be sure the grade requested is marked on the carton or container in which eggs are displayed for sale.

There has been no change in paying prices for poultry since last week. There appears to be a sufficient supply of poultry of all kinds for New Year's.

Wholesalers and retailers are quoting producers for undrawn poultry—Chicken Grade A 51-2,

turkeys grade A 60-7, Geese grade A 47-50, ducks grade A 45-8. Retail prices to consumers are as follows: Chicken Grade A 51-2, turkeys grade A 73-8, geese Grade A 55-60, ducks grade A 55. Grades lower than quoted should sell for somewhat less. The grades are A, B and C and all poultry offered for sale should be wing tagged or stamped. Check the grade when buying.

Note: Approximately 15,000 lbs. of poultry was sold in Charlottetown during the Christmas period.

INCREASED MILK

For pasteurized milk is one cent lower than the lowest in Nova Scotia, which is 17 cents in the town of Amherst.

"The increase in the price of cream was caused by the high cost of separating milk bought at the rate of 95c per lb. butterfat, which was practised by some distributors who were actually losing money on the sale of cream," continued Dr. Carson.

"Four factors were considered in advancing the price of milk. First, the brief presented by the Producers and Vendors' Association shows an increase in the cost of production; secondly, producers were considering separating their milk and getting good butterfat prices and have the skim-milk to raise calves and pigs which, at the present prices, would be a considerable income; thirdly, a decided scarcity of milk in the Charlottetown area and fourthly, the threat of Halifax and Sydney buying Island fluid milk for mainland consumption," stated Dr. Carson.

Quicker last evening, Major McRae, a producer who was on the committee of three which presented the brief to the Board, stated that although Island producers were getting less than mainland producers, he felt that the increase was "very fair and that the producer will probably get by all right this year."
