THE POTATO CONGESTION.—Although some forty or fifty projected cars as well as a number of box cars, arrived on the Island since pressure was brought to bear on the Canadian National Railway last Friday, the situation, though somewhat relieved, still leaves much to be desired, and there is constant danger that large consignments now waiting shipment, will be lost through frost. A vessel is now loading approximately 40,000 bushels of table stock for a firm in New York and today the S. S. Orkild is expected from Montreal to load 60,000 bushels of seed potatoes for Long Island, being shipped by the Potato Growers Association.

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Charlottetown School Of Navigation

The November "Sailor," recently issued, contains the following article on the Charlottetown School of Navigation. The article is accompanied by fine cuts of the Navy League Building and Capt. M. C. Allenby, R. N., Principal of the School.

The "Sailor" is a widely read periodical published in Toronto, and reaches all parts of the Dominion. This article, therefore should prove good advertising for the Island.

The Navigation School at Charlottetown has been established and is maintained by the Navy League of Canada.

The President is Mr. J. O. Hyndman, the head of the Prince Edward Island Division of the Navy League and the Principal and Nautical Instructor is Capt. M. C. Allenby, R. N., who is an intimate relative of Lord Allenby, the victor over the Turks.

He acted as Navigating officer for seventeen years, served for three years in the Compass Department at the Admiralty, and was for seven years (1914-1921) superintendent of the Chart and Chronometer Depot at Sheerness, out of a total of thirty-five years spent in the Royal Navy. He has a technical and practical knowledge of Navigation second to none on this side of the Atlantic.

He took out a Master's certificate in the Mercantile Marine in 1914 and has been a Younger Brother of Trinity House since 1902.

The equipment of the school is new and up-to-date in every particular. It consists of Model Sema-phores, Terrascope, Commercial Flags and Mast, Rule of Road Models, Sextants, Barometer, Thermometer, Colscope (the latest invention for teaching rules of the road at sea. Also a Deviascope, as well as other instruments, books and essentials necessary to the equipment of a first class Navigation school.

The Navy League Building, in which the School will be held, faces the beautiful harbor of Charlottetown, from which a splendid view is obtained of all the salient points of the Bay. The beacons, buoy and horizon are natural assets to practical navigation. In this institution students of navigation and seamanship may obtain instruction second to none in North America.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que. Nov. 12.—There continues to be a steady inquiry from the United Kingdom buyers for grain on the Montreal market in nearby positions and a moderate amount of business was done in Manitoba spring wheat and oats. There was also demand for Canadian western barley for November shipment but as the prices bid were two cents per bushel below working basis no sales were made. In the domestic market exporters were asking for no. 1 northern wheat and sales of several loads were made at 12 1/2 cents per bushel over the Winnipeg November option C. I. F. Montreal. The trade in oats was inactive and the tone of the market was easy with carlots of Ontario and Quebec no. 2 white quoted at 52 cents no. 3 white at 50 1/2 cents and no. 4 white at 49 cents per bushel ex track and sales of odd cars of Ontario malting barley were made at 85 1/2 cents per bushel.

The flour trade was without any new feature to note. The undertone of the markets for spring and winter wheat flour being steady and prices were unchanged. The volume of business was moderate sized. Prices for all grades of millfeed were well maintained under a good demand. The tone of the market for standard grades of rolled oats was firm owing to the scarcity of supply. The tone of the egg market was firm, prices failed to show any change but this is expected in the near future. The butter market was firmer and prices were a fraction higher. The trade in cheese was quiet and prices steady.

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que. Nov. 12.—The export trade in Canadian grain on the Montreal market today was reported quiet there being only sales of a few odd loads of oats to the United Kingdom.

Ontario and Quebec No. 2 white oats quoted at 53 cents. No. 3 white at 50 1/2 cents and No. 4 white at 49 cents per bushel ex track while odd cars of Ontario malting barley changed hands at 85 1/2 cents per bushel, ex track and dump 3 bush wheat sold at 1.73 per bushel ex track.

There was little business transacted in the flour markets and prices for both winter and spring wheat grades were steady while a firmer feeling prevailed in the market for millfeed owing to the improved demand for supplies prices failed to show any change. The feature of the trade in standard grades of rolled oats was the stronger feeling and prices were advanced 10 cents per bag. The egg market was without any new feature to note, business being fairly steady under a good demand. The butter and cheese markets were quiet but prices were unchanged.

Ottawa—Fresh eggs of the higher grades are very scarce on all markets. Storage prices continue steady with firm undertone. Prices generally are unchanged, cold storage holdings of eggs in the United States Nov. 1st, are reported at 5,320,000 cases and holdings of frozen poultry as Toronto fresh special, 65, extras 55, 51st 50, storage extras 44 1/2, firsts 41, seconds 35. Montreal demand for fresh eggs continues to be in excess of the supply.

Winnipeg market is steady with receipts of fresh very scarce, jobbing fresh extras 58 to 63, firsts 50, seconds 35, storage extras 46, firsts 41 seconds 34, Saskatchewan and Alberta markets unchanged. British Columbia buying country points extras 60, firsts 58, jobbing extras 65, firsts 63 seconds and pullets 53, Charlottetown rallying extras 50, firsts 45, poultry offerings are slow, chicken 14 to 21, fowl 6 to 14.
