 C. F. Goldthwaite, in charge of the advertising department of the Canadian National Railways for the past eight years, has resigned to become associated with the Montreal Office of J. J. Gibbons Limited, Advertising Agency, in the capacity of Account Executive.
 Mr. Goldthwaite has a wealth of experience acquired in newspaper and advertising work in this country and the United States. Starting out as a newspaper reporter, he served in various capacities on the editorial staff of newspapers in Boston, Toronto, Montreal and Ottawa. Later he abandoned newspaper work to enter the advertising agency field, in which he continued until 1924, when he assumed his duties with the Canadian National Railways. In addition to his extensive agency experience, Mr. Goldthwaite was for some time advertising manager of a large department store, this giving him an insight into retail advertising and merchandising which will prove a valuable asset in his new association.
 During his service with the Canadian National Railways, Mr. Goldthwaite has become well-known in the transportation field in Canada and the U. Toronto Merely "Colored Eye" To Opera Leader
 NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—What Moscow was to Napoleon and his dream of world empire, Toronto is to Fortunato Cardo and his French-Italian Opera Company, the members of which returned here bedraggled and dejected today after an admittedly unsuccessful musical culture forage on the Northland.
 Mr. Cardo and his troupe beat their weary retreat from Ontario and the Canadian border, arriving in the Metropolitan Bus Terminal in Thirty-fourth Street today, stiff from sitting nearly twenty-four hours bolt upright.
 Mr. Cardo found it difficult to restrain his waspish mood about Canadians in general and citizens of Toronto in particular. The elegance of the high hat sloping over the maestro's right eye, his yellow spots, the waxen masculine beauty of his moustache, failed to ease the Gargantuan miseries that beset him in the bus terminal.
 He remarked sadly that he had attempted, as a musician of the French-Italian Opera Company, to improve Canadians, and they had not only continued to be absorbed almost exclusively in the price of wheat, but worse still, as Mr. Cardo stretched, tugged at his moustache and teetered on his toes to show his apparent disdain for all non-musical-minded mortals, it developed that the opera company became stranded in Toronto after leaving here on Oct. 25.
 Mr. Cardo softened a bit at the memories of the not-too-frosty reception accorded them at Hamilton, Ont., but even gestures did not suffice to interpret Toronto. He declared they were made to "play in a hall that was like a barn;" the hostelry authorities were adamant against the voice of culture and insisted pettily on talking about bills, and on the night of the benefit that was to pay for the company's return to the States, the gross was precisely \$700—not enough to settle for the hall.
 "Bah! mind you," the maestro added, shaking, "his Worship the Mayor was there himself."
 "A critic in New York is had enough," commented Mr. Cardo, as he was joined by Michael Santos, also a downcast musician with the opera company, "but the razzberry, she echoes two times in Canada." Messrs. Cardo and Santos agreed that Canada's treatment of their fellow-artists was a "black mark for the future, a colored eye for later."
