—Work was commenced yesterday on the building of the concrete sidewalk on Central St., Summerside, from Strong's corner to the Y. M. C. A. corner. Alfred Gaudet is in charge of the work.

—S. M. Hicks, Agent of the Black Diamond Line, Summerside, received word yesterday that the Bonavita, the first steamer of this line to call at Summerside will arrive here on Sunday night from Montreal.

—Rev. Jas. McDougall will preach on Sabbath, the 29th, at Summerside at 10:30. Scarborough at 9 and Cape Traverse at 7, and on Thursday, June 2nd, at DeSable at 7:30 p. m. Session meets at DeSable immediately after service.

—Among those registered at the Queen Hotel, Summerside, yesterday were A. J. Curran, Rexton, N. B.; B. Dwyer, Richibucto; H. L. Harrison, M. C. McDougall, Moncton; B. W. Castin, Lynn, Mass.; R. A. Hillman, Lenora Batten, Lowell, Mass.

—Summerside dealers are paying eighteen to twenty cents a bush for potatoes, ten dollars to ten fifty a ton for pressed hay, ten fifty a ton for loose hay, seventeen cents a doz for eggs, thirty-eight to forty cents for oats and ten to ten and a half cents a lb for pork.

—Rev. Alex. McGillivray, of Toronto, Past Assistant Supreme Chief Ruler of the I. O. F. and one of the ablest platform speakers in Canada, will spend about a week in this province this summer and his program includes a visit to Summerside on Sunday, June 12th. Service will be held in the Methodist Church, at 11 o'clock. Mr. McGillivray will also preach at Kensington, in the Presbyterian Church, on the same day at 3 p. m., and at Clifton in the evening at 7.

—Several fires were narrowly averted in Summerside yesterday evening, which if they had got started with the strong wind that was blowing would have likely caused considerable damage. The first was a chimney fire in the west end of the town which burned for a considerable length of time. The next was caused by a fire cracker which caught in the roof of Mrs. James McLeod's barn on Summer St., and which was put out with a bucket of water. The third was caused by a kerosene lamp which overflashed and took fire about 8:30 p. m. in a store on Water St., which was put out with little or no damage except to the lamp. In no case was the Fire Dept. called out.

—On Tuesday evening, while working alone in his saw-mill, William Dunn of Cape Traverse was struck by a board and fatally injured. Though suffering greatly he stopped the machinery of the mill and walked to the house of one of the neighbors who drove him to the home of his father-in-law, Charles Wright. The doctor was immediately summoned and everything done to relieve the pain of the injured man. The next evening he seemed better and it was hoped that in a few days he would be at work again, but on Thursday morning the community was shocked to hear of his sudden death. The deceased was thirty-seven years of age, of a very retiring disposition, quiet, sober, industrious and obliging, with many virtues and no vices. Those who knew him best loved him most. He leaves to mourn a sorrowing widow and one daughter, Bessie, aged four years; one sister and four brothers—Eliza, James and Thomas of St. Eleanors, Arthur of Halifax, and John of Mansfield, Mass.—for all of whom much sympathy is felt. The funeral service, which was largely attended and which was conducted by the Rev. Mr. McDougall and Rev. Mr. Steele, was held on Friday, May 20th.

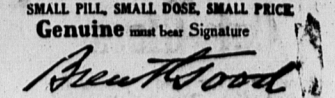

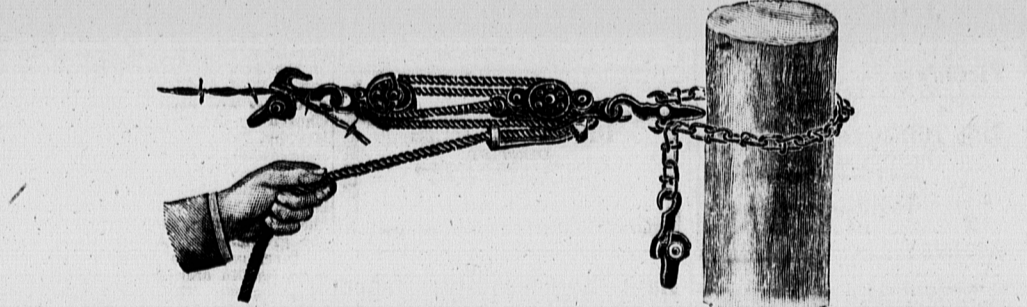

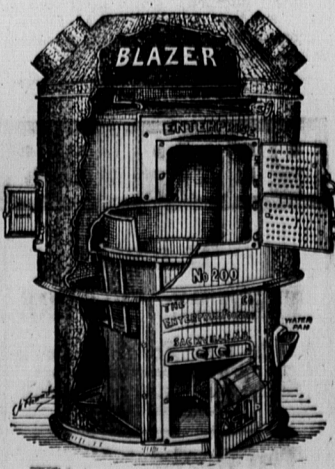
