EDINBURGH, Scotland, Oct. 7.—Legacies were left the leaders of the Social Nationalists party and the Socialist party by Jane Keenan, eighty-two years old, who died here recently. She left some \$38,000 in equal shares to John Redmond, Wm. Redmond and James Keir Hardie.

PRESIDENT TAFT RIP VAN WINKLE.

LISBON, N. H., Oct. 5.—President Taft is a constitutional Rip Van Winkle. Winston Churchill, Progressive candidate for Governor, declared at a rally here. "About ten years ago," said Mr. Churchill, "St. Louis was struck by a cyclone. At the height of it a baby was blown in at the window of a worthy couple and landed on a bed unharmed. Now, Mr. Taft has about as clear an idea of the force which blew him into the White House and which will presently blow him out again, as that baby had of the cyclone which blew him into the window."

SIX KILLED AS CAR AND AN AUTO CRASH.

FORT WORTH, Tex., Oct. 7.—Six persons are dead as the result of a collision between an automobile and a car on the Dallas-Fort Worth interurban line, fourteen miles east of here, last night. The victims are Rufus C. and Mrs. Cornelius, their three small children and a young woman guest of Mrs. Cornelius.

RICHARD CARTWRIGHT'S PROBABLE SUCCESSOR.

OTTAWA, Oct. 7.—There is a strong probability that the vacancy in the senate created by the death of Sir Richard Cartwright will be filled by the appointment of Harry Corby, of Belleville. Mr. Corby was formerly a member of parliament for East Hastings, and has been active in the politics of Midland, Ontario.

PRIEST REFUSED TO MOVE ALONG.

TORONTO, Oct. 8.—Because he refused to move on when ordered to do so by a constable, Joseph Pheacilade, a Bulgarian priest, who was holding a meeting on King and Trinity streets on Saturday night, was arrested. The man was speaking in the Balkan states war, urging his listeners—all Bulgarians—to help their country. He was allowed out on bail because of the plea of Interpreter Evans, who is to be married by him today.

COMMITTED SUICIDE.

TORONTO, Oct. 6.—Mrs. Esther Levi, aged 44, committed suicide yesterday at her home, by inhaling illuminating gas.
