In Sofia, Bulgaria, which has been occupied in a German troop movement to the Turkish and Greek frontiers, some informed diplomats said that Hitler wanted the Turks to scrap their alliance with Britain and sign up with Germany as the one power that could "protect" Turkey against the historic designs of Russia.
