"Yes, this is home--now. And I'm glad to hear you say so, my dear." She laid a gentle hand on Elinor's arm. "I never thought we'd keep you."

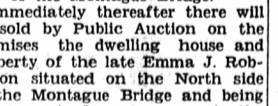
