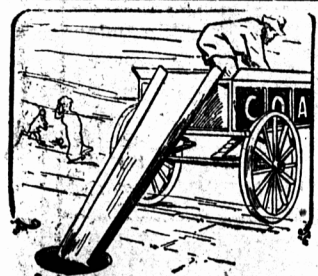

Arrangements have been signed between the Province of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and British Columbia and the Dominion Government by which the control of the oyster beds is handed over to the Provincial Governments. The beds have formerly been under control of the Dominion and with none too satisfactory results. Hon. J. D. Hazen is anxious to give all the encouragement possible to the oyster industry and decided it was better to place control of the leases in the hands of the Provinces. An Act to this effect was passed last session. Prince Edward Island has already mapped out 14,500 acres at the famous beds at Richmond Bay for leasing purposes.—Truro Exc.

WHAT DO YOU THINK. M. le Bary, a Parisian matinee idol, said to be the best dressed man in France, asserts that he spends a minimum of \$6,000 a year on his wardrobe. As clothing is supposed to be half as expensive in Europe as on this side of the Atlantic, M. le Bary's clothing expenditure is equivalent to about \$10,000 in the United States, and some experts who have been interviewed on the subject in the latter country express the opinion that he is exaggerating. They point out that to be a good dresser a man need have only about fifteen or twenty suits a year, as, on a pinch, he can wear a suit for as long as a couple of months, and even an evening suit need not cost more than \$125. With the exception of overcoats, which run from \$75 to \$150, the evening suit is the most expensive item in the wardrobe of real "swell dresser," and there are few Beau Brummels who have more than \$150 worth of underwear in their wardrobes at any one time. A man cannot pay more than \$30 for a hat and get the worth of his money, they say, and really good socks can be had at from \$1 to \$3 a pair. After making all allowances, his American critics are convinced that M. le Bary does not spend \$6,000 a year on his clothes, unless he includes his theatrical costumes in the calculation. The fact is that for three or four thousand dollars a year a man can acquire some little reputation as a fashion plate even in New York City, for the day of the "dude" is gone, and there is a strong tendency towards conservatism in male attire. This is probably due to English influence, for the English have the idea that for a man to make himself conspicuous by his dress is bad form, and it is just as bad if the conspicuousness is due to magnificence as to shabbiness.
