A PROGRESSIVE DIARYMAN.—An interesting report of a progressive dairy herd is among the items of interest that have come to this office. The herd belongs to Mr. Bert R. Brown of Little York is composed of thirteen head of pure bred Aryshires and eight grades, for the past number of years Mr. Brown has been keeping individual records of his cows and the result is evident in the fact that during the past nine months his herd of eleven milking cows, including one two-year-old, produced 64,821 lbs. milk or 2527.7 lbs. fat. The production of several individuals in the herd are as follows, 7011 lbs. milk in nine months with 4.8 per cent. fat as the highest test, 7489 lbs. milk in 11 months with 4.8 per cent. fat as the highest test, 8267 lbs. milk in 10 mths. with 4.8 per cent. fat as the highest test, 8667 lbs. milk in 6 months with 4 per cent. fat as the highest test and 7807 lbs. milk in 10 months with 5.1 per cent. fat as the highest test. The total receipts from ten cows of the herd was \$700 for the past year. Mr. Brown believes that the utmost effort to improve the fit and in pursuance of his plan has erected a modern stable during the past summer. The stable has a cement floor, metal stanchions, full equipment for watering and a ma-

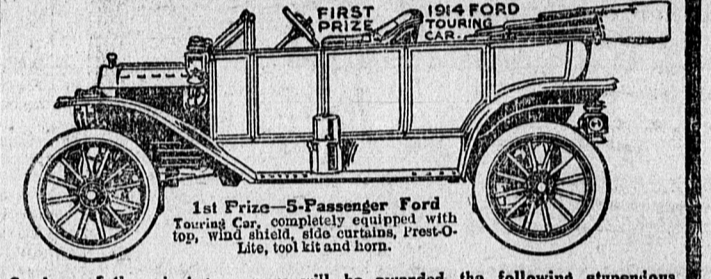
