## Detroit Defeat Indians Third Successive Day

NEW YORK, May 28 (AP)—The pattern of their 1940 success today overcame Detroit's Indians in a 11-1 slugfest at Detroit to defeat the American League leading Cleveland Indians 8-5, for the third successive day.

Knocking in with four errors, the pitcher blasted Mel Harder from the mound and finally clinched the victory for the Indians when he hit the score. Ray Mack's three-run homer in the seventh chased the Indians from Detroit and Al Tronzo from Detroit received credit for his third victory.

Gene Campbell, belting his fifth home run in six games, led Detroit's attack against three right-handers. In Chicago, St. Louis Browns, after losing to Detroit, won a 4-1 lead over the first of the sixth in-

## Joey packs \$18,600 bonds In saddle bag

WINNIPEG, May 28 (CP)—Joey, stout-hearted little black thoroughbred which has won more money than any other Canadian race horse during the past decade, beat the starter's gun today when he packed \$18,600 worth of 1941 Victory Loan Bonds into his saddle bag to become one of the first Victory Bond Buyers in the campaign which opens Monday.

The bonds represented 50 per cent of Joey's earnings over the last nine years and were purchased by R. James Speers, honorary secretary of the Prairie Thoroughbred Breeders and Racing Association. At Polo Park, where Joey will be stable for the month-long racing meet which opens Saturday, race horse owners, stablemen and handlers will have an opportunity to buy portions of the thoroughbred's bonds.

## Cardinals Take Close Verdict From Chicago

NEW YORK, May 28 (AP)—The strong finishing Cardinals snatched another victory right out of their opponent's hands at St. Louis today, defeating Chicago Cubs 6-5 with a three-run rally in the ninth inning.

Although out hit 11-9 and three runs down as they moved into the stretch, the National League leaders put together a double, a triple and two singles to sweep the series and mark up their ninth consecutive victory.

Duplicating the feat of Johnny Mize, who, despite an injured finger pinch batted for the Cards to a ninth-inning victory over the Cubs last night, Don Padgett swung for catcher Gus Mancuso at the crucial moment today and singled to score Steve Mesner from third with the winning run.

At Cincinnati, backed by Max Butcher's heavy hurling, Pittsburgh Pirates coasted to an easy 7-4 victory over the Reds to split even in the two-game series.

Butcher scattered a dozen hits through seven of nine innings but only in the eighth and ninth did the Reds score, gaining two runs in each.

## Six Rangers Will go on The "block"

VICTORIA, May 28 (CP)—A break-up of the famed New York Rangers team that won the Stanley Cup in the 1939-40 season but finished only fourth last season, was announced today by Manager Lester Patrick, who said that six of the players on the National Hockey League club are on the "block."

Patrick, who guided the team that went 19 consecutive games unbeaten in the 1935-40 schedule, revealed that goalie Dave Kerr, defenseman Art Coulter and centerman Clint Smith are up for sale or trade to other NHL teams. They were three of the stars in the great Ranger drive of two seasons ago that saw the team set a mark for consecutive unbeaten games.

Patrick did not immediately reveal the names of the other three players that he intends to let go.

## M.R.A. Director Receives threats

TORONTO, May 28 (CP)—Toronto police tonight were searching for the person or persons responsible for two telephone calls today to the office of Fred Open, managing director of the Metropolitan Racing Association, during which someone threatened violence to the racing official's wife and children unless Long Branch Race Track opens Saturday.

The police announced the threats a short time before a statement was issued by the Incorporated Breeders Association and the I.C.R.A. was settled by tomorrow or Friday. The dispute, which started last week with a boycott of I.C.R.A. meets by the breeders, forced cancellation of the Thorncliffe meeting which was to have started last Monday and finished Saturday.

## Recreation Center For Airmen At Summerside

A representative of the Guardian recently had the pleasure of being shown the recreational and entertainment facilities at No. 5 Service Training School near Summerside. Both the equipment for and the efforts being made to keep the men in a fine state of mental and physical health deserve the highest commendation. The whole program of sports and entertainment is under the direction of P. O. Wilson who is P. T. and Drill officer, as well as sports officer.

For the success of his efforts it is evident that he has spent a lot of time and energy on this phase of work. The men of No. 5 Service Training School are most fortunate in having Wing Commander Fullerton as their commanding officer, as he is co-operating to the fullest extent in the sports program.

It was explained that the authorities are more interested in sports between groups within the station than in competition with outside groups. Although this is also encouraged. The reason of course is that the facilities and equipment are for all the men and not necessary only for those who exercise in the gymnasium with its punching bags, horizontal bars, etc., and the floor is marked off in volleyball courts, basketball courts and indoor baseball courts. Most of the leagues which have been functioning all season have concluded their schedules. The volleyball league had 15 teams and was won by the sergeant's team. The basketball league also had 15 teams and was won by the sergeants. There were 17 badminton teams and the series was won by No. 13 barracks. The baseball (indoor) league is in the final, the two remaining teams being No. 9 barracks and Course 27 (student pilots). There were 16 baseball teams. The gymnasium during the day is used as a drill hall, seven one-hour periods being held daily which include every man on duty. P. T. is given the trainees regularly.

The recreation building is equally well equipped. It has two badminton courts, a number of ping pong tables, an excellent stage and a balcony. This is where church services are held and the chaplains available to any of the men during certain hours. Through the co-operation of Mr. Chandler of the P. E. I. Libraries an eight hundred book library is being installed. There is also a writing room. Motion pictures are held three times a week, there is a dance every two weeks, and occasional stage shows. Mr. John Walker of the Y. M. C. A. Red Triangle Club is very active in providing entertainment. The air men have an excellent orchestra and band and an 18 piece trumpet band is being formed. A great deal of the afore-mentioned equipment has been donated and the remainder has been purchased out of mess and canteen funds.

## Noted London Landmarks hit

LONDON, May 28 (CP)—The Blitz permitted the announcement today that several noted London landmarks, including the Temple, Gray's Inn, Serjeant's Inn and the Nicholas Cole Abbey had been damaged in recent German air attacks.

The Temple, heart of legal London, and Temple Church, largest of the remaining round churches in England, suffered heavy damage.

The tomb of Oliver Goldsmith, in the churchyard, was battered by a bomb which hit his statue but a chip knocked from the tip of the nose.

Flames spreading through the church, whose round section was constructed in 1185, burned for six hours, melting the leaden roof and destroying stained glass windows.

The ancient masters works of crusaders' Temple originally was the seat of the crusading order of Knights Templar—were made unrecognizable by tons of falling masonry.

It was said authoritatively that the Temple was destroyed.

Gray's Inn, fourth and last of the four Inns of Court, to which many famous Elizabethans belonged, also was heavily damaged. The 16th century hall was destroyed and the library, with most of its 20,000 volumes, was burned out.

A relic of the last Great War—remains of a German incendiary bomb which fell in the neighborhood, was lost, but a catapult was planned by Sr. Walter Raleigh and undamaged.

## Norway has Never stopped Fighting Nazis

LONDON, May 28 (CP)—Norway has never stopped fighting since Germany overran the country last spring and will not stop fighting until complete victory is won, says the Royal Norwegian Government information office.

Norwegian participation in the raids in the Lofoten Islands and on Okstjord shows Norway's fighting forces are preparing themselves for offensive operations when the appropriate time comes.

The Royal Norwegian Army constitutes the nucleus of Norway's expeditionary force. Immediately after King Haakon and his government arrived in Britain last June an army training camp was established at Scotland.

While training here Norwegian troops are taking an active part in defence of Britain against possible invasion. A detachment from the camp went on the successful expedition to the Lofoten Islands and on the equally successful raid on Okstjord. Another detachment has been in service in Iceland since last autumn.

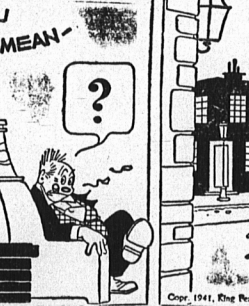

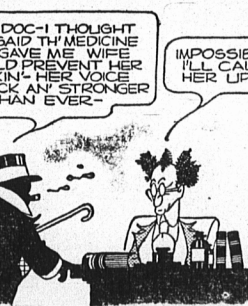

## THE NORWEGIAN NAVY

The Norwegian navy has never been out of action since the small whaler, Pol III, fired the first shot attacking German warships on the night of April 8, 1940.

Norway's small navy suffered severe losses during the Nazi invasion, but the German navy suffered worse. Norwegian naval units and coast batteries sank 80,000 tons of Nazi warships, including the cruiser Blucher.

When the campaign in Norway had ended, the navy immediately came into service under the operational command of the British Admiralty.

It was restored to its former strength by the addition, first, of four of the United States destroyers transferred to Britain last autumn, and second of a large fleet of fast Norwegian whale-catchers, armed and equipped for special duties.

The Norwegian navy plays an important part in mine-sweeping, guarding convoys and patrolling the coasts.

Commander-Captain H. Rissner-Larsen now is in Britain with his staff making preparations for the entry of Norwegian airmen into active service against Germany. It is expected it will not be long before the first units start operations flying.

Norway's merchant fleet, the most modern in the world, is playing an indispensable part in the battle of the Atlantic. Fleet tonnage in June, 1939, was 4,834,922, greater by 340,000 tons than that of Germany.

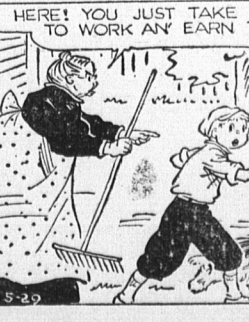
