## THEN AND NOW.

As stated by Premier Peters at the Board of Trade meeting, October 8, the proposals of the promoters of the Dominion Packing Company were such "that if carried out would be one of the greatest boons the Province ever received," and "we would be mad to refuse their offer." He "knew the members of the company had a good reputation. Some of them are millionaires." Very different from this was the statement made by the Premier at the Marshfield meeting with regard to the company. We quote from the Examiner's report:

The name of the company was "The British America Packing Company," whereas the name of the company now established here is the Dominion Packing Company. Moreover, Mr. Wiley said that the company would be comprised of such men as Mr. Ross of Montreal, Mr. Shields, Mr. Pease, Mr. Wilson, Mr. Pearson, etc., whereas it appears that the company is composed of lawyers and lawyers' clerks. He did not believe that they would be able to do that which they had promised, and on the last Friday before he left for Halifax Mr. Pearson, the promoter of the company, had told him that the company thought they would "paddle their own canoe" and not require the guarantee, because they did not care to be bound by the onerous stipulations set forth in the Minute of Council. He said: "I'll see you later." "And," concluded Mr. Peters, "that's the whole unvarnished story."

From this it would appear that the "millionaires" had in the meantime disappeared from the scene and from the company. In their place we have a company composed of lawyers and lawyers' clerks. This is indeed a sad declension in a financial point of view. Moreover, the name and style of the Company has also been changed, for what reason does not

appear, but that is not an assuring circumstance of itself. What is of consequence is that the Premier now "does not believe they will be able to do that which they promised," and may not require the guarantee. They do not care to be bound by the stipulations of the Order in Council and will "paddle their own canoe."

Following this we have the Premier's reply to Mr. Turner regarding the guarantee,—"We're not going to do it." And this is enforced by The Patriot editor in the words, "There is not and in all likelihood never will be any guarantee of bonds." Thus do the Premier and his official organ proclaim that the guarantee business is dead. So we have had a series of dissolving views. The Company of millionaires which loomed so large on paper, has disappeared; the guarantee of bonds which was a central feature of the agreement, has disappeared also. Even the ability of the Company to carry out their engagements is, according to the Premier, very doubtful. We are left to imagine as best we can what is to become of the agreement, which it would be "madness" not to have made, and of the "boon" to the people which was to result.

The Patriot goes further and now tells its readers that even "the ghost," of the guarantee, we presume, "has been laid, and well laid too." We take it that this is the conclusion of the whole matter. The guarantee is dead and buried, and even its ghost, last seen about the lowlands of Marshfield, has been successfully exercised and will walk abroad no more. The people will welcome the tidings that the guarantee is dead and will have little fears of the ghost. But to those who gave the guarantee scheme its being, loaded, nursed and praised it, only to strangle it last, there may be consolation in the hope that its ghost will never "revisit the glimpses of the moon," or appear in the Council Chamber, or at the festive board to shake its gory locks and say "Thou didst it."

The writ for the by-election in Cardigan Third District of Kings, has been issued and the nomination and polling will be on the same date as for the West River District—December 2nd and 8th respectively. The vacancy in Cardigan was caused by the death of the late Hon. Malcolm McDonald.

The Doukhobors are home again and will have the cost of their pilgrimage to pay. The Government rightly takes the view that the orderly people of the Dominion ought not to be charged with the expense caused by the irregular conduct of the Douks. Besides the lesson of cost may prove a whole some one to those who will have to pay.

Hon. D. Farquharson. It is announced has made arrangements with the postal authorities by which a mail will be despatched from Charlottetown to Bonshaw on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. With this added to the present service the offices at North River, Cornwall, Clyde River, New Haven, Churhill and Bonshaw will enjoy the great advantage of a daily mail.

A. J. B. Mellish, as appears by a letter in the Patriot, took the pains to inquire into the truth of one of the Black Knight's stories, assuming that the incident referred to by Mr. Hector occurred in Eureka, South Dakota. There are some five towns of the name Eureka in various parts of the United States, one of them in Nevada and another in California. Mr. Hector's story referred to a mining town and therefore would fit one of the other Eureka's much better than that in the grain state of South Dakota. Moreover a prominent citizen who heard Mr. Hector inform us that he did not locate the scene of his story in Dakota. From all of which we conclude that the information sought for and obtained by Mr. Mellish with so much pains is probably true enough, but still counts for very little in discovering The Black Knight's veracity.

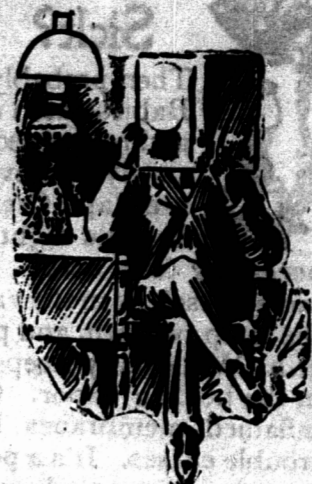

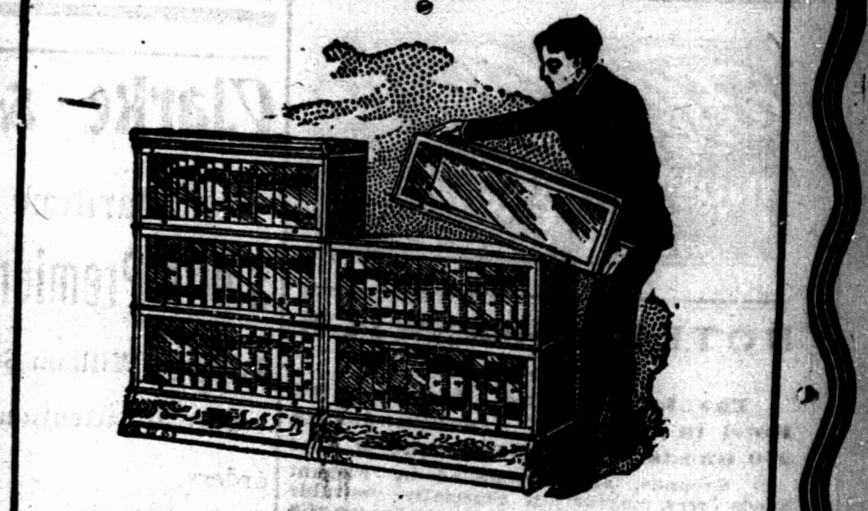
