CHICAGO, Jan. 29—(AP)—Wheat prices dropped more than a cent a bushel here today to the lowest figures in three to four months.

Wheat closed 7-8-1 3-8 lower, May 82 7-8-3-4, July 77 1-8-1-4; corn 3-4-1 1-8 lower, May 71 7-8-3-4; July 62 1-8; oats 1-8-1-4 down.

At the day's low point, May wheat at 82 1-2 was the lowest since Nov. 6 and July, at 76 7-8, was the lowest since Oct. 5.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 29—(CP)—Weakness at Chicago gave wheat futures prices a bearish tone today on Winnipeg grain exchange. Domestic mill purchases boosted quotations fractionally near the start but losses on the southern market brought reaction and values finished 1-4 cent lower here. May at 76 3-4 and July 78 3-8 cents a bushel.

At Buenos Aires, Argentine values continued in the rut along which they have run almost unchanged for some time.

TORONTO, Jan. 29—(CP)—The market decline quickened its pace today on the Toronto exchange.

Turnover showed little change from Tuesday at 260,000 shares.

Recessions of a point or more were noted by Canada Packers, Canadian Dredge, Great Lakes Paper pfd, Riverside Silk and Steel of Canada common and a half point or more by Abitibi pfd, Brazilian Traction, Canada Cement, Canada Steamships pfd, Canada Wire B. Canadian Breweries pfd, Canadian Car, Distillers-Seagrams and Fleet Aircraft.

Narrow net gains were held by British American Oil, Bathurst Power A, B. C. Packers, Gattineau Power, Greening Wire, Hamilton Bridge National Steel Car and Steel of Canada pfd.

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Currencies

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The currency has declined this week following a burst of strength last week after the Central Bank of Switzerland refused to sell francs for any but commercial purposes.

The free pound Sterling at \$4.03 1-2 and the Canadian dollar at a discount of 17 1-4 per cent were unchanged. (Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.09—9.91 per cent discount.)
