The Stanley also left Pictou for Summerside, and at this writing (Saturday evening) had neither arrived at her destination nor returned to the port of departure. In consequence of the storm there were no mails arriving from the mainland, though a considerable crowd gathered at the Post Office as usual, knowing that the Princess had sailed from Pictou and not having heard of her return.

NURSES REBUKED.

Ran up the Union Jack in Place of Old Glory.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., March 31.—Charged with insulting the Stars and Stripes by setting up the Union Jack in place of Old Glory, two Canadian nurses in the Connecticut State Hospital have been rebuked.

Those who were rebuked are Miss Sara Henry, superintendent of nurses, and her chief assistant, Mrs. Mary Goldsmith.

When the nurses here hung out the Stars and Stripes to celebrate a Boer victory it was torn down by Miss Henry and Mrs. Goldsmith, who put a Union Jack in its place. In investigating the affair the hospital doctors found that Miss Henry had been importing Canadian girls to become nurses, and giving them unusual privileges.

The Chairman of the Board of Visitors to day said that Miss Henry and Mrs. Goldsmith would leave the hospital.

Miss Henry said: "The flag incident was due to a misunderstanding. It is not true that I have shown a preference for Canadian girls in the hospital."

RETURNED TO WORK.

General Thousand Striking Machinists Have Gone Back to Work.

CHICAGO, Ill., April 2, 1900. About 3000 of the machinists who have been out on strike resumed work today and the remainder will undoubtedly return during the next few days. The strike has cost the men half a million dollars in salaries, while the loss to the manufacturers cannot readily be calculated.

Some of the machinists late to-day wanted to have the strike resumed, alleging that some had been refused their old positions, in direct violation of the agreement with the employers. "It's all right," said Mr. O'Connell, president of the union. "These are minor difficulties. It takes time to readjust machines when they get out of order."
