Dominion Live Stock Report

MONTRÉAL, Que., June 22.—There were 88 cattle, 172 sheep, and lambs, 517 hogs and 547 calves for sale on the two markets this morning. There was very little demand for common grass cattle and the bulk of the offering was made up of this kind of cows. Trading was slow. Common cows were quoted from \$3.50 to \$4.75. Calves were easier. One choice lot was picked out at \$30.00. They average 150 pounds and three or four straight lots of medium quality veals were sold for \$8.00. Common suckers and heavy fall fed calves were sold from \$6.50 to a shade better. Grass calves were quoted at \$5.00 to \$6.00. A few spring lambs were sold for 17 cents per pound and sheep were unchanged from yesterday. Hogs were lower. Very few sales were made today above \$15.25 and several pair quality lots were sold for \$15.00. Heavy sows and feeders were not wanted and anything along that order was very hard to sell. Some heavy hogs were sold for \$13.00 and others reached \$14.00. Sows were mostly \$11.00.

Meeting of Lobster Packers and Fishermen

A largely attended meeting of the lobster packers and fishermen of the North Shore was held in the Board of Trade Rooms yesterday at 2 o'clock for the purpose of considering the advisability of asking the Government for an extra season from August 10th to September 15th.

The meeting was presided over by Mr. Harry Cox who was appointed chairman, and Mr. Kendall Lacey secretary.

The chairman then announced the object of the meeting. He stated this was a poor season with many of the fishermen and when the catch was poor with the fishermen it was necessarily poor with the packers.

Mr. Ellis Lacey said he thought the second season should be given a trial. It worked out advantageously some few years ago and he thought the Stars and Stripes and September was a better pack and Mr. P. J. McIntyre said he came in to hear the opinions of others but since he was asked his opinion he would give his personal opinion and that was—if we are to have two seasons from August and September it was a better pack of the fishermen. A great many fishermen did not have a successful season and if they wished to petition for an extension he would place a lively discussion on it was decided by a standing vote, which was practically unanimous (only three opposing) that the government be asked to grant a fall season, starting about August 15th and continuing till September 20th for this year.

A committee was appointed to draft the resolution and submit it to the Government.

RACES AND SPORTS.—Kensington "fans" are taking a keen interest in the coming Dom. Day Races and athletic sports in S'Side. Several entries from Semple's stables are expected to take part. Elimination contests will be held next week in Kensington to decide who will compete for the R. T. Holman Co. C.C.M. trophies on Dominion Day. It is expected that the ten mile relay race will start from Kensington at nine o'clock a.m. Large crowds always witness the race.

BUSH FIRE.—A bad fire Friday June 18th, on the "back" land between the Irieh town and Malpeque roads, arms destroyed the last vestige of green timber on the farms of James Dunphy, George Cotton, and John Bryenton. This is the third time within the last few years that this section has been "scoured". It was caused this time by a small fire getting beyond control of a man who was engaged in clearing the land for Mr. Daniel Goodwin. "Safety first" should be the motto with respect to "clearing" fires. It is dangerous to start a clearing fire at certain times and under certain conditions, and it is almost criminal to let it get beyond control.

Blocked Procession

As early as five o'clock this morning crowds were in their places in the stands and at ten o'clock the scheduled starting time, the sea of humanity which surged about all sides of the already packed stadium, blocked the path of the ecclesiastical procession for almost an hour, delaying the Mass and taxing the efforts of the police to open a narrow lane for the prelate.

As the priests, bishops and cardinals passed through many dropped in their knees for the blessing of the Legate. Inside the procession was greeted first with an enthusiastic outburst of handclapping and then with reverent silence and prayer. Their brilliant robes whirled about in the strong wind. The twelve cardinals ascended the red carpeted steps to the Sanctuary to red velvet and plush thrones set in long diagonals at either side of the Altar.

Thousands of Priests

Cardinal Bonzano was escorted to a throne most splendid and highest at the right of the Altar. Here he vested for the Mass, donning a set of hand-made silk ceremonial presented to the Congress by a Chinese delegation as the gift of a group of Shanghai women and children of the Altar. Again the Mass lasted an hour and a half, after which the procession again formed for the exit of the higher prelates the several thousand priests remaining in their places about the foot of the Altar. Again the procession was halted by the pressure of the throngs about the clergy gate, and it was more than an hour before the last of the purple robed bishops left the Sanctuary.
