At this period the Pioneers, seeing that they ought to take a hand, began to play and for the next few minutes the fans were treated to some of the snappiest hockey seen in St. Peter's. A pretty combination run by Pratt and Anderson took place. Pratt scoring, amidst hearty cheers from the followers of the home team. Two minutes after Gillis of the home team repeated the trick on a long shot from centre. No further scoring was done and the half ended, with the puck in dangerous proximity to the Comets net, the score standing 2-1 in favor of the Pioneers.

The second half opened with a rush. Both sides worked hard. It was at this period that Gaudet of the visitors took a hand, making a run the full length of the rink, finding the net and thus evening the score. Some fast work by Kelly, Gaudet and Davison soon turned the tide in favor of the visitors. Gaudet found the net on a pass from Kelly and shortly after repeated the dose. The score now stood four to two in favor of the visitors. The Anderson brothers of the home team now came down the ice in a very pretty piece of combination, scoring number three for the Pioneers. Some fast individual stick-handling was demonstrated by Kelly of the Comets, making a run the whole length of the rink and scoring. The score now stood five to three. For the next few minutes McKenzie of the Comets was kept busy; Robblee of the visiting team now scooped the puck and with a pretty shot from about quarter ice scored number six for his team. Davison repeated the trick two minutes later. Some fast playing by the forwards of the home team took place and shot after show was rained at the visitors goal—but failed to connect. From a face off in front of the Comets goal the nets were penetrated, this time by Gillis. The score now stood seven four in favor of the visitors but five minutes to play.

Garrett here made another run finding the net once more, for his home team. The bell sounded and the game ended with the puck in the visitors territory. The score was 8 to 5.

The visitors expressed their appreciation of the way in which the game was handled and no doubt the people of St. Peter's will yearn from these two teams at a future date. If not this winter perhaps next summer in a game of base-ball.

The men are granted a minimum scale of wages, and a compromise has been arranged on the question of hours.

PROMISING OUTLOOK.

TORONTO, March 13.—"The whole world was shocked at the Titanic disaster, but there was a Titanic disaster every day in the year there would be still 200,000 short of the numbers killed by the liquor traffic in the United States every year," said Rev. Fr. Rankin, speaking at St. Paul's Church on the subject, "The Church and Alcohol." "Seventy-five per cent. of all the crimes committed in Canada can be traced to the liquor traffic," said the preacher.

COL. GARRARD'S RECORD CLEARED BY MR. TAFT.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—One of the last official acts of the Taft administration was the issue of an order by the president expunging from the military record of Col. Joseph Garrard, fifteenth cavalry, commander at Fort Myer, Va., the reprehensible statement to him because of his unfavorable endorsement upon the examination papers of Frank Bloom, a young Jewish private who was seeking a commission. Col. Garrard's endorsement, in substance, pronounced Bloom undesirable because of his family conditions and religion, which endorsement President Taft severely condemned. The effect of this last action is to clear the way for Col. Garrard's promotion to the rank of general officer.
