QUARTERMASTER GIVES EVIDENCE

(Canadian Press) QUEBEC, June 18.—It was asserted by James Francis Galloway, Quartermaster of the Empress of Ireland, that the steamer did not steer well; that her wheel jammed a few hours before the collision which sent her to the bottom of the St. Lawrence on May 29th; that she swerved badly; that the crew of the steamer Alden could testify to these facts and deny the claims by responsible officers of the lost steamer were statements made at to-day's session of the Dominion Commission inquiry.

ENGLISH POLO PLAYERS WIN

MEADOWBROOK CLUB, WEST-BURY, L. I., June 17.—The international polo cup, emblematic of the world's championship, will cross the ocean again, having been won here yesterday by the English team in the second game of the series by a score of 4 to 2. Although the American defenders made a desperate last ditch stand they were not quite equal to winning. Their thrilling rushes, both individually and as a team in the closing minutes of the struggle aroused forty thousand spectators to a frenzy, however, and no previous international polo struggle ever closed under such tense and exciting conditions.

HAVANA, June 16.—Colonel Chas. Senor Canal is connected with a number of prominent families and there are fears of further trouble.

MINISTER OF LABOR COMING TO P. E. I.

OTTAWA, June 18.—"I could place ten thousand men on farms in Ontario alone," said Hon. T. W. Crothers yesterday before leaving for Prince Edward Island, where his medical adviser has ordered him to go for a month's rest. Mr. Crothers was seriously ill of erysipelas recently, and is not yet in the best of health. The Minister of Labor discussed the labor situation throughout Canada. Reports to Ottawa from various centres are that there are many out of work. "The trouble is," said Mr. Crothers, "that so many of these men refuse absolutely to go on the farms. Everywhere there is an outcry for farm help. As a people we are losing money because we can't get the land tilled as it should be. What-ever militates against the farmer militates against Canada as a whole. If we could only induce those out of work to go into the country away from the city and its free dinner tables, it would be a great thing for this country."

ANOTHER COLLISION AT SEA, CLOSE CALL FOR 1,000 PASSENGERS

German Liner Kaiser Wilhelm Rammed by Freighter During Dense Fog. Gaping Hole Torn in her Side. Had Left Southampton for New York. Passengers Safely Transferred to Another Steamer.

(Canadian Press) SOUTHAMPTON, England, June 17.—The North German Lloyd steamer Kaiser Wilhelm II., which left Southampton shortly after noon today, bound for New York with a thousand passengers, lies at anchor tonight off Netley, three miles to the southeast, with a big hole in her side amidships caused by a collision with the Liverpool grain steamer Incemore, bound from a Black Sea port for Antwerp. The Incemore, a much smaller craft than the German steamer, of 3,000 odd tons is in dock here with her bows badly smashed. The collision occurred in the English channel, thirteen miles south of the Nab lightship, in a dense fog. Just how it occurred and on which vessel lies the responsibility cannot be ascertained at the present time.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN WATERTOWN

(Canadian Press) WATERTOWN, June 18.—Twelve buildings were wiped out with a loss of more than \$100,000, when a fire which started in a barn of the Burdock Coal Company, swept the northwestern section this afternoon. Twenty thousand tons of coal was destroyed.

(Canadian Press) CAMBRIDGE, June 18.—At the Harvard commencement exercises today, the degree of Doctor of Laws was conferred upon Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, member of the British Privy Council and Chief Justice of Canada.

ENTERTAINED AT LUNCHEON

(Canadian Press) LONDON, June 18.—Earl Grey, who had arrived in England a few days ago, after an extended trip, presided at a luncheon given by the Royal Colonial Institute yesterday at which Sir Percy Fitzpatrick was a guest. Sir Percy is a well known writer, financier and politician. He is an authority on South African affairs and took an optimistic survey of the present condition, claiming that the great industry in South Africa is expressed in words: "We make History." He defended the action of the South African Government in the labor trouble on the ground that mobilization of a citizens' army entailed such heavy loss on the community that the Government was bound to make its recurrence impossible. He stated that South Africa had done its duty in Imperial defence. He eulogized the Canadian club idea.

MGR. STAGNI'S VISIT TO SOURIS

Mgr. Stagni, the Apostolic Delegate, was accorded a most loyal and hearty reception on his visit to St. Mary's Parish, Souris, on Monday evening, the 15th inst. His Excellency accompanied by Bishop O'Leary and the secretary of the Delegation, Mgr. Sinnott, arrived at Souris by the express from Charlottetown. At the station the pastor, Rev. R. B. Macdonald, the parishioners of St. Mary's and many others, making an increase of the train to greet His Excellency with a hearty and joyous welcome. At 6.30 the train arrived at the station. The large crowd having formed in procession proceeded to the Parochial House presenting an impressive and imposing appearance. The procession was headed by the Holy Name Society, the C. M. B. A. and the B. I. S., coming immediately after the societies in carriages were His Excellency, the Delegate, His Lordship Bishop O'Leary and Mgr. Sinnott accompanied by the pastor and visiting clergy from the neighboring parishes, the mass of the great gathering following behind the carriages on foot. The Souris band discoursed excellent and appropriate music. The whole procession presented a striking and pleasing spectacle. The beautiful decorations with an arch, inscription, flags, banners and bunting in Papal colours added much to the festivity of the occasion. A feature worthy of special mention was the part taken by the pupils of the Convent school who, to greet the Delegate, were marshalled in front of the Convent in the splendid form and manner that the Sisters of Notre Dame know so well how to put into execution. When the procession arrived at the Parochial House, it stopped, divided and stood along each side of the line of march, while His Excellency and the clergy passing between these guards of honor entered the Presbytery.
