BEDEQUE SCHOOL FAIR

A most successful school fair was held in Bedeque on Friday, Oct. 5. The following school districts combined for the purpose: Searletown, Fernwood, Lower Bedeque, North Bedeque, Mt. Stowe, Chelton, and Bedeque. The fair was held in the spacious hall at the latter place, owned by Mrs. Dr. Sutherland, who kindly gave the use of it for the occasion. The day being ideal a large number of parents were present to encourage the teachers, of whom too much cannot be said for their untiring efforts, for the success of their first school fair. All interested are under obligation to the following Judges: Prof. J. A. Clarke, Prof. Tennant, Prof. McLarty and Miss Sterns. Among the visitors were Supt. Shaw, Prof. Blanchard of P.W.C., Mr. Hensley of Bank of Commerce. Prof. McLarty directed the sports, and early in the games won the good will of the contestants by his genial manner. There were a number of blank entries in grains, roots, vegetables, flowers, fruit, cooking, manual training, poultry collections, school work, and a blank number in sports.

The financial end of the enterprise was satisfactory, about \$50 being contributed by the combined districts for prizes.

At the close of the fair an organization was formed with a president, vice-president, secretary-treasurer and an executive, composed of all the teachers, trustees and one representative from each of the schools, the object being to carry on an annual fair and work therewith.

The ladies of the Red Cross served lunch in connection with the fair, and raised the creditable sum of \$36.

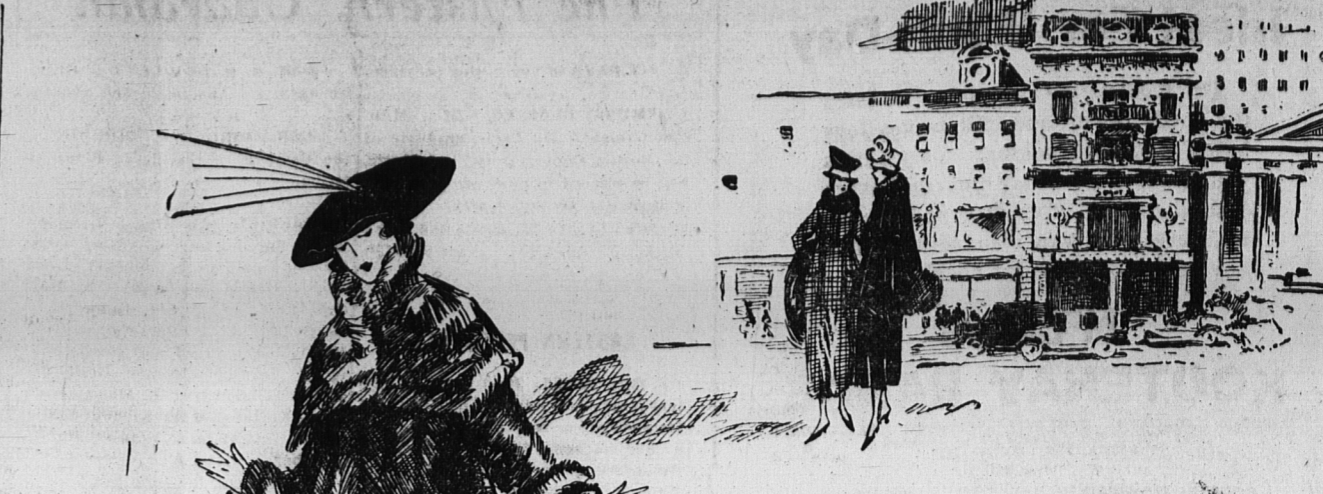
