DAUGHTERS OF THE EMPIRE. — The Royal Edward Chapter of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire held its annual meeting on Saturday at Mrs. G. W. Hutson's, when favorable reports on the year's work were submitted. During the past year eleven meetings were held. On the 10th of August, the first special meeting, after the outbreak of the war was called in reference to equipping a hospital ship to be presented by the women of Canada to the British Admiralty and through the Dominion Government asking our Chapter to help in the endeavor. Five hundred and thirty two dollars was raised for this purpose. A musical entertainment given by some young

people summering at Holland Cove, under the auspices of the Daughters of the Empire. The proceeds amounted to \$149, which amount was voted for Red Cross work, as the Chapter tendered its services to that Society. Sewing meetings have been held weekly with a fair attendance, first in St. Paul's schoolroom, then the Ladies' Club kindly placed their room at the disposal of the Chapter to work in on Monday afternoons. A box of very useful articles, consisting of mufflers, Balaclava caps, wristlets, socks, shirts, night shirts, pyjamas, bands, etc., was sent to the Red Cross headquarters. A box of useful articles was also sent to our own men at Salisbury Plain. One hundred and seventy nine dollars was subscribed and \$79 was subscribed by some of the members of the Princess Mary Fund. Calls for the Princess Mary Fund, National Chapter contributions for the belts amounting to thirty three dollars and fifty three cents, showing a total of \$922.29, nine hundred and twenty two dollars and twenty nine cents, raised for various purposes. It may be mentioned that the total membership of the Chapter is thirty-five.

EGG CIRCLE. — The annual meeting of the members of Corran Ban Egg Circle took place in the Library Hall at Grand Tracadie on Feb. 16th. The President, Mr. Ronald J. McDonald, introduced Mr. Marcellus of the department of Agriculture, Ottawa to a large and enthusiastic audience. The learned instructor gave a vivid picture of what is expected from individual members of a co-operative circle, and made a strong appeal to his hearers to improve the quality of their produce and to cooperate with the manager and it must follow that the egg market for select stock will be well and evenly maintained. ANOTHER BATTERY OF ARTILLERY TO BE RECRUITED. HALIFAX, March 3.—In less than three weeks the recruiting for the Maritime Provinces' complement for the third contingent has been completed, and now the Sixth Mounted Rifles and the 40th Battalion are over strength. Many more applications for enrollment have been turned away. The rifles are now 545 strong, and there are 1,025 men in the infantry regiment. It was announced by the Military Headquarters last evening that another battery of artillery is to be recruited, and enlistments commenced today for the 25th field battery of the 7th brigade.

INDICT HAMBURG-AMERICAN LINE FOR CONSPIRACY. NEW YORK, March 3.—The federal grand jury, which has been investigating violations of the customs laws in connection with the furnishing of supplies to German cruisers in the Atlantic, returned an indictment today against the Hamburg-American line and six men alleged to have been connected with the shipments. The indictment charges conspiracy to defraud the Government through the filing at the customs house of false records, false clearances of vessels, and false manifests of cargo.
