**RELIGION AND HAPPINESS.** (By Mr. J. E. Middleton.) Goethe said that Christianity was a religion of sorrow. Another writer less eminent, but, in this case, more just, expressed the opposite view in a rhetorical question. "Why should the children of a King, Go mourning all their days?"

In our time, men are beginning to realize that happiness comes from the greatest measure of self-realization. The young man rejoices in his physical strength. The intellectual rejoices in his power of thought. It is only reasonable that the man who has trained his spiritual nature to larger vision and greater activity should rejoice in his spiritual strength. There is no trace of egotism in such enjoyment. A trained musician hears the C Minor Symphony by Beethoven with ecstacy. He is not admiring his own power of appreciation, but rather the genius of the composer. Similarly, as soon as any natural gift is enlarged by exercise, the pleasure of the man is increased.

The early Puritans who groaned at their work and at their children, the men who labelled themselves and their Maker by calling one another "poor worms," were extremists, with a distorted view of life and its privileges. They were the ones who denounced laughter and frowned on the play of the child. Some of them were great and notable figures who served their generation well, but it is probable that less whining if the nose would have improved them materially and would have given them a greater influence.

One wonders what they thought of praising the Lord with the high sounding cymbals, "King David's touches of 'frivolity' must have been distressing to them. There is no aid to happiness so effective as a good conscience. The man who disciplines himself by doing his best in all activities; the man who has complete confidence in the Divine governance of this world is not a "mourner here below." He thrills to every stimulus. He lives the fullest, the most satisfying and the most joyous of lives. Christianity is not a religion of sorrow. It is rather the road to happiness.

**DUSKY PARIS SWEEPERS** Paris streets have recently gained in picturesque by the employment of colored scavengers. Ebony hued Senegalese and copper colored Arabs from Algiers and Morocco, whose terra cotta fez contrast so deliciously with the pale blue soldiers' uniform, clean or effect to clean metropolitan thoroughfares.

**ANIMALS DIE ON SUBSTITUTES** Animals in the zoo in Berlin have died in large numbers recently, principally because the substitutes which they have been given instead of their accustomed food could not be digested sufficiently to sustain life. Among the species in which the mortality has been greatest are the giraffes, mandrills and chimpanzees. The health of the surviving animals is not good.

According to Hamlyn's Menagerie magazine, published in London, the Berlin Zoological society declared that while dates and bananas and other tropical fruits were unobtainable, the apes were fed on a kind of biscuit made of musty flour.

The carnivora manage to live on scraps from the slaughter houses, but the animals requiring grain and seeds are not thriving well on the wild roots given them as substitutes.

**IDENTIFICATION TAG.** There has been a good deal of unfavorable comment in the navy on the prescribed method of wearing the identification tag on account of the behavior of the woven wire necklace, which rides up on the neck and inconveniences the wearer in various ways. These features have been overcome at the naval training station, San Francisco, by lengthening the wire so as to permit of its being worn bandolier fashion from above the left shoulder, to below the right arm, the tag hanging a few inches below the apex of the right axilla. In this way the wire does not ride up and to its companion smilingly of the body.—Army and Navy Register.

**AIRMAN GOT A "SUB."** One minute passed, two minutes, four minutes. We had roared over six miles of sea, and still I could see the little fountain ahead. Then I saw the submarine. She was a mile away, a big grey Fritz of the U-class, long flush deck, leaning toward the bows, coming toward between bow and stern, two guns, one before and one aft of the conning-tower, and a straight stem. She was sailing through the water at top speed, about through the water and above her bow was the little fountain.

It was caused by a thread of water running up her straight stem and leaping into the air about five feet.

It glittered in the sun. Two men were on the conning tower, but they did not see or hear us coming. We were attacking up wind and down sun. We read part of her number, U4, but the second numeral was blurred.

Forty seconds after seeing the U-boat Dickey pulled the release lever and dropped one bomb. He threw up his arm. I banked over and looked down. The bomb had detonated on the starboard side half way between the conning-tower and the stern.

The submarine heeled slowly over to port. She stopped in her own length and began to sink. Cuckney close behind me passed over. I saw a bomb burst on the starboard side right in front of the conning-tower. Her decks were now awash. An explosion occurred in her bow and several smaller explosions between the stem and the conning-tower.

By this time I was again in position and Dickey dropped a second bomb. The bomb detonated about thirty feet above the conning-tower. The very top of her conning-tower was showing. And then she vanished.

The little fountain had been fatal. From Squadron Commander T. D. Hallam's new book, "The Spider Web," an account of his own share in fighting submarines in the North Sea. Commander Hallam is a native of Toronto.

Fur Trade Dept., said the other day that the catches received so far are the advance guard sent out from the interior by natives in need of an immediate "krub stake." So far as he could judge, there will not be the absolute shortage of muskrat, which had been rumored, but not undoubtedly would be scarcer, as it had been for three years. Lynx, while scarce might be expected to show a slight improvement over 1918, when it reached the lowest ebb since 1910.
