## NATIONALISTS

### RAISE RUCTIONS

In the Imperial House of Commons Causing a Disgraceful Scene.

## SIXTEEN WERE SUSPENDED AND DRAGGED OUT

They Shout, "God Save Ireland."—Names of Some of the Offenders. Balfour's Bill to Provide for Expulsion in Future.—Redmond Claims Innocent Men Were Punished.—English Papers Call for Severe Penalties.—Irish Papers Rejoice Over the Riot as Another Lesson to England.

### NATIONALISTS RESENT THE CLOTURE.

LONDON, March 6.—(Special).—After midnight last night, in the House of Commons, Mr. Balfour applied for closure on the education estimates.

The Nationalists shouted "Gag," "Gag," and refused to leave the House when the division was taken.

### REFUSE TO LEAVE THE CHAMBER.

Members were asked to retire to the lobbies as usual, but the Nationalists refused, whereupon sixteen of them were named by the Speaker, and they were afterward, on motion of Mr. Balfour, suspended.

The Speaker then ordered them to withdraw, but they refused.

### FORCIBLY EJECTED BY THE POLICE.

A number of officers and policemen then entered, and after much resistance the recalcitrants were carried out, some of them shouting "God Save Ireland."

Those who were removed included John Gullivan, Patrick White, Patrick McHugh, Wm. London, Wm. Abraham, Patrick Dugan, Anthony Donelan and

James Gilhooly.

### EXPULSION IS NOW THREATENED.

To-day Mr. Balfour introduced, a Bill to change the evils by making expulsion for the remainder of the session the punishment for such scenes as those of last night.

### THE ENGLISH AND IRISH PAPERS.

The papers are taking widely different views on the scenes. The British papers condemn the scenes and demand punishment. The Irish papers rejoice that Ireland at last has a party that will teach England that neglect of Irish wrongs can only be accompanied by the sacrifice of the character and privileges of Parliament.

### AFTERMATH OF THE ROW.

Redmond to-day made a claim that some members were actually suspended who had gone to the lobbies to participate in the division.

The Speaker promised to rectify any wrong. Messrs. Jordan, McGovern and Donelan are the members wrongfully suspended.
