Bad Luck Comes To Lucky People

(By British United Press) LONDON, March 30. - Bad luck nearly always seems to pursue those who have had the good luck to win mammoth lottery prizes, or in other ways to get rich quickly. It is curious that in the twelve months the bankruptcy courts have revealed three stories of such fortunes speedily dissipated. At Canterbury recently a man who had won \$100,000 in the Calcutta Sweepstake only seven years ago, was stated by the Official Receiver to have spent the whole of this fortune, and to be hundreds of dollars in debt.

Lancashire mechanic a short while before had to confess that his sudden wealth had melted even more quickly. When he won \$55,000, he imagined that his "luck was in," so he straightway went to have a good time on the Continent with designs on the bank at Monte Carlo. His fortunes vanished in two years and he was compelled to return to his old job.

Mr. Carrer, who simply cannot keep money, however much or little they may get, it seems to burn holes in their pockets," as an Official Receiver said of a third victim of unluckily fortune. This man's story almost justified his own touching faith that he had been born under a lucky star; unfortunately, he could never let well enough alone. He wasted three big fortunes in five years. First he won \$50,000 in a lottery and lost it. He borrowed a little capital to return to the tables at Monte Carlo, and won \$35,000. This was dissipated in Paris, and then he returned to England to settle down to work. But once again fortune gave him her smile, and he won a prize of \$10,000. Again it quickly vanished, and he found that his golden road of good luck led to the bankruptcy court.

"She shot me first and then wounded herself," de Trafford told the police. Soon he, too, became unconscious. De Trafford is reported to have told the police that he was involved in a love affair with the countess and that she had shot him after a jealous scene.

Britain Rejoices Over American Co-operation

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, March 29. - The British public is reading with great satisfaction the news contained in New York and Washington despatches announcing that Anglo-American co-operation in China is meeting with general approval in the United States and that Admiral Williams' hand is being strengthened by the despatch of more marines. That there will be need for further close co-operation between the American and British forces before the Chinese situation is solved is fully realized here, and the fact that Britain will have America alongside of her to deal with any further anti-foreign excesses has brought a feeling of intense relief.

Gould Seeks Duty On Maritime Spuds

BANGOR, Me., March 29. - In an open letter to the secretary of the Penobscot county Grange, U. S. Senator Arthur R. Gould states his reasons for voting in favor of the McNary-Haughen farm relief bill. He says in part: "In my campaign last fall I promised people all over the State that I would work for their best interests if sent to the Senate. As I see it, I am faithful to my promise so far. If you were better acquainted with the potato interests of Aroosook you could not but see very plainly what is needed for their protection. The present duty on potatoes from the Maritime Provinces is so small that it permits of their bringing seed potatoes into our market at much less expense than we can produce them from Aroosook. Therefore they are selling a large quantity of seed stock in our market. By standing by the western farmers, we are promising some of the members of their support when it is needed. This past short session of Congress didn't allow for any such matters to be brought up. I am preparing for a fight for agricultural interests of Maine at the next session, and I have a lot of friends by standing by the middle west people, and the bill was defeated. I am sure a spite of what may be said to me personally, I will stand up to me personally."
