Company Head Believes Bottom Is Reached

NEWARK, N. J. April 12.—(A.P.)—Eugene G. Grace, President of the Bethlehem Steel Company, told the stockholders today at their annual meeting the company had shown a net decline in income of more than \$19,000,000 in 1932 as compared with a net balance of \$115,745 in 1931, but said he was "in no sense pessimistic" about the situation.

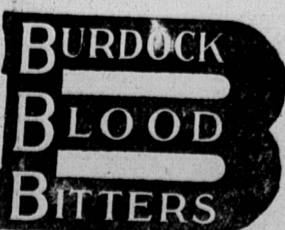
"It would look to us," Grace said, "as if we had found the bottom of business. With our operations at a point below which they have not declined for nine months we think we have a right to feel that we have seen the worst or are now at the worst."

The company, he said, has resumed operations in several plants which have been long idle, and is now operating at 15 per cent capacity. During the first quarter of this year the company shows a loss of about \$5,000,000, Grace said. He remarked that the company could remain solvent another year even without improvement in business.

Charles M. Schwab, veteran chairman of the Board, was optimistic as usual about the future.

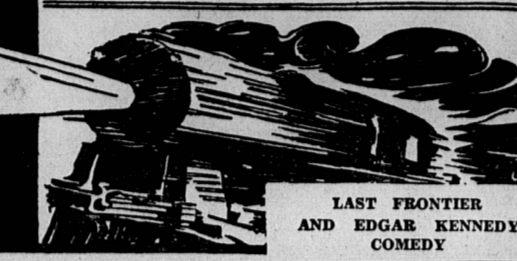

Modern Methods Reduce Hazards Of Mining (Canadian Press)

HALIFAX, April 12.—Greater safety of present day coal mining methods as compared with those of a few years ago is strikingly illustrated in Premier Gordon S. Harrington's report on mines, tabled in the Legislature. Fatal incidents claimed only 1.02 lives out of every 1,000 men employed in the collieries of Nova Scotia last year—the lowest figure in the 18 years covered by the report.

Even more illustrative is the fact that the 13 lives claimed in mining operations last year represent less than one half the number of men killed in the previous year. Twenty-eight miners were killed at their work in 1931.

As in former years, falls of roof or face continued last year to prove the greatest hazard to the lives of the men who take out the coal, the report shows. Falls of rock and coal caused seven deaths. Only one surface accident proved fatal.

Modern Methods Reduce Hazards Of Mining (Canadian Press)

HALIFAX, April 12.—Opportunity for expansion of Nova Scotia's trade with the British West Indies is a wonderful one, in the belief of Lester L. Glass, Canadian Trade Commissioner.

Imperial Conference treaties, Mr. Glass said, have paved the way for this increased trade. Another reason exists in the adverse exchange between the West Indies and the United States, which gives the West Indies money greater purchasing power in Canada.

A particularly excellent market is offered for Maritime products, the Commissioner believes, in the supply of wearing apparel. Out of an annual market for \$1,700,000 Canada has supplied clothing to the value of only \$3,500. Exports might also be increased, he asserts, in the lines of butter, condensed milk, and manufactured biscuits.

But a careful study of market conditions in the Indies must be made, Mr. Glass warns, by the manufacturer intending to embark in business with the islands. The importance of this is necessary because of exact requirements in certain commodities, notably fish and potatoes.
