Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sale hereof of a family or any male over eight years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agent or Sub-Agent in the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agent, but not Sub-Agent, unless a credit note is obtained.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land for one year. Homesteader may file within the time of the homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, certain conditions. A homestead house is required except where residence is performed in other ways.

In certain districts a homestead in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section in another homestead. Price \$200 per acre.

Duties Six months residence in each of the years after earning homestead right; also 200 extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has obtained his homestead right may take a purchased homestead right in another district. Price \$50 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years, cultivate 30 acres and erect house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, stony or rocky land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
