IN MEMORIAM

E. E. MacMILLAN

Ewen Ernest MacMillan, former member of the city treasurer's department who was buried here Saturday, July 16th, had been a resident of Saskatoon since 1908, and was widely known in the city. Mr. MacMillan was born at Cove Head, Prince Edward Island, nearly 70 years ago. On October 28, 1896, he married Miss Frances Abbott, of Union, P. E. I. The ceremony took place in Boston and Mr. and Mrs. MacMillan lived there for 12 years, afterwards coming to Saskatoon with their daughter, Doris. The family has resided here continually since that time. Besides his widow and daughter, now Mrs. Hugh Tiers, 628 Seventh

Avenue, North, Mr. MacMillan is survived by two grandchildren, one brother, Blair MacMillan, of Calgary, and three sisters, Miss Frances MacMillan, of Indianapolis; Mrs. Dag, of Vancouver, and Miss Gertrude MacMillan, of Los Angeles.

Many friends and acquaintances attended the funeral services Saturday at the chapel of the Saskatoon Funeral Home and joined in the cortege to Woodlawn Cemetery. Rev. J. A. MacKenzie, of Knox United Church, and Canon W. L. Armitage, of St. John's Cathedral, officiated. Two favorite hymns, "The Ninety and Nine" and "Blessed is the Man" were sung. Mr. MacKenzie, who delivered the funeral sermon, took his text from Micah 6:8: "What doth the Lord require of thee but to do justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with thy God." The minister pointed out how excel-

lently Mr. MacMillan's life had been patterned on that instruction and spoke of the loss to Knox Church occasioned by his death, a church which had benefited by his presence and devoted interest. Pallbearers were: W. N. Howell, L. D. Peterkin, J. O. McCallum, Prof. J. A. MacDonald, W. H. Cleveland and J. A. Forrester.

Mr. MacMillan had been seriously ill for more than two years with a heart ailment.—Saskatoon Star-Phoenix.
