-ANNUAL MEETING - The annual meeting of St. Mark's Credit Union, Lot 7, was held in the Parish Hall, Oct. 28th with a large attendance of members and non-members. The President, Rastford Locke, in his address reviewed the steady progress made during the five years since the Union was organized. He urged the members to continue increasing their share capital and deposits which are insured so that the money saved, up to \$1,000 is doubled at the death of the member. The treasurer's report, presented by Leo Dalton, showed that the members' shares had increased \$2,200, deposits \$1,200 and loans \$4,000. The present assets are \$24,000. The report of the Credit Committee read by Bennett Howard showed that 92 loans had been made, and that these are covered by the loan insurance, so that, at the death of the borrower, the balance due is covered by the insurance. The dividend received that 2 per cent be paid on shares, 1-1/2 on deposits with those over 70 years, who are not covered by the insurance, receiving 1 per cent additional. The retiring directors, Leo Dalton, Henry Dalton and Clifford Colquhoun were re-elected as was Peter Rogers of the Credit Committee. Harrison Thompson was elected to the supervisory committee. The meeting was then addressed briefly by Prof. Frank McMillan of P.W. College, Dan McKay, Dave Griffin, George Shubin and Fr. Robin. The ladies members then served a very tasty lunch.

-ANNUAL MEETING - The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held last night in the Town Hall with the president Mr. W. M. Veilish presiding.

The matter of the rates on trucks charged on the car ferry is the subject of the meeting. The opinion of Mr. L. R. Allen that the stated amount of \$15.75 charged on trucks returning loaded was not correct. The secretary was instructed to take the matter up with the chairman of the Transportation Committee and to have the schedule of rates at the next meeting of the Board.

Mr. Alan Holman brought to the attention of the Board the fact that since the car ferry is under the control of the Canadian National Railways a strike of railway employees would almost completely tie up transportation to the mainland and the only outlet in that event would be by the Wood Islands ferry. He believed the ferry should be taken over by the Department of Transport and in the event of a railway strike that trucks could be ferried over and thus there would be an outlet for farm produce at least.

The vice-president Mr. T. Earle Hickey suggested that the band instruments which were on loan to the S.Y.C.I., and which were the property of the Board of Trade should be taken in and stored, due to the fact that the S.Y.C.I., for the present has suspended operations. Mayor Arnett said that sufficient room could be found in the upstairs of the Town Hall to store them and the vice-president was instructed to have this done.

Mr. Alan Holman stated that the 26-ray unit now in Summerside was not being used as it should be. Only about 50 people were being examined daily when 250 could be accommodated. It was pointed out by Mr. Holman that many people are under the impression that because they were examined two years ago there was no necessity of a further examination now. He stated that this was a false impression and exhorted everyone to take advantage of the unit for an up to date check up.
