PRINCE COUNTY AND THE PATRIOTIC FUND

Rousing Speeches in the Supreme Court Result in Starting Subscription List Which Now Totals Over \$1,000.

An unprecedented and unique departure in connection with the proceedings of any Court of Law in this, or probably any other country, occurred in the Prince County Supreme Court House, Summerside, on Wednesday afternoon, when His Lordship, Mr. Justice R. BALKAN SITUATION IS BRIGHTENING

Italy Will Not Make Separate Peace and is Sending Troops to Help Serbians.

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Dec. 2.—Italy through her foreign minister, Baron Sonnino, has announced her adherence to the treaty of London, whereby the Allied Powers undertake not to conclude a separate peace and at the same time has declared her intention of sending help to the Serbian army in the Balkans. This news is the most important for some days and it is believed here will go far to clear the situation, especially in Greece, where negotiations are still proceeding between King Constantine and his cabinet and the ministers of the Quadruple Entente.

TALK OF PEACE TWO MORE GREAT PLAYS BY YOUNG-ADAMS CO.

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—There is still a good deal of talk in the neutral press about peace, based on reports from Germany on the activity of Socialists and from Austria on the dissatisfaction there of alleged German attempts to take control of the internal administration, as has been the case in military affairs. It is considered significant that all the new Austrian members are men with German leanings, which is thought to mean that the German party has been successful.

HEAVY FIGHTING ON WESTERN FRONT

Strong Enemy Positions Bombarded and Damaged. Several Mines Sprung. Two German Aeroplanes Brought Down by British Guns.

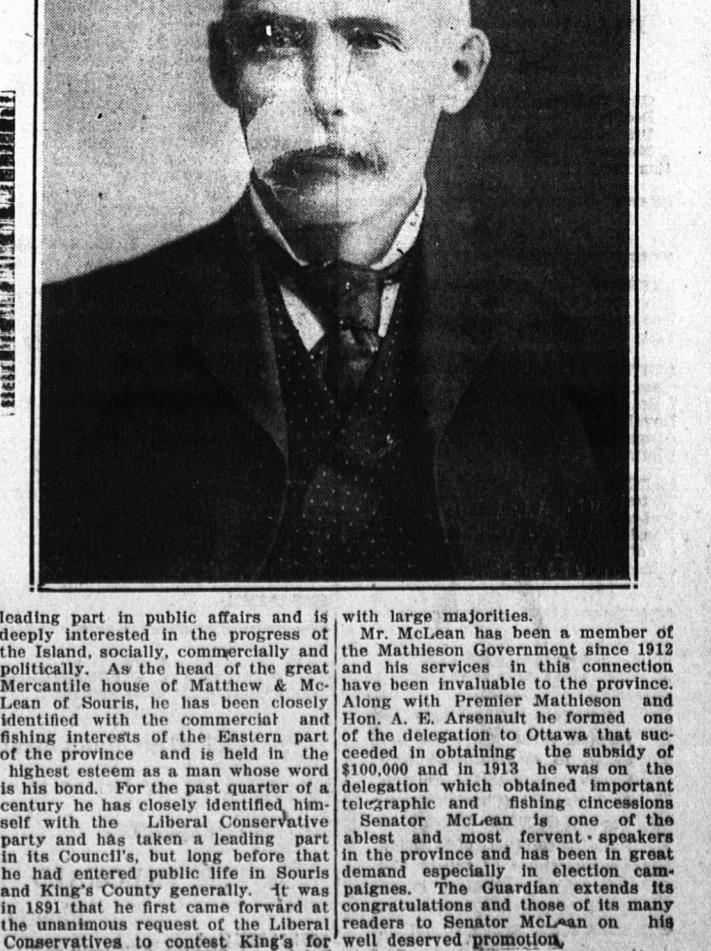
(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Dec. 2.—An official communication from general headquarters has been issued:—The enemy at Cevaucq, reported yesterday on the left bank of the Dvina, near Sennenhoff, an arm between Friedrichstadt and Jacobstadt, were subjected to a heavy fire by our artillery. The Germans were completely surprised and fled, leaving behind a hundred killed or wounded. On the left bank of the Styr the enemy was driven back towards the south-west of Khriask. The rest of the front is without change.

(Special to the Guardian.) PARIS, Dec. 2.—Despatches from Saloniki and Florena, Greece, forwarded by way of Athens and Rome, say that arrangements have been made for the surrender of Monastir. It is said a commission consisting of the Greek and the Serbian Metropolitan and the Mayor of Monastir, has been appointed to negotiate terms of surrender with German and Bulgarian representatives.

HON. JOHN McLEAN PROMOTED TO SENATE

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—Hon. John McLean of Prince Edward Island was appointed to the Senate to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Robertson of King's County. Other appointments to the Senate were Hon. Dr. Sproule, Speaker of the Commons; John Milne, Hamilton, Ont., and M. C. P. Beaubien, K.C., Montreal.

The promotion of Hon. John McLean to the Senate will be received with general approval throughout the province. Mr. McLean has long taken a leading part in public affairs and is deeply interested in the progress of the Island, socially, commercially and politically.



Mr. McLean has been a member of the Matheson Government since 1912 and his services in this connection have been invaluable to the province. Along with Premier Matheson and Hon. A. E. Arsenault he formed one of the delegation to Ottawa that succeeded in obtaining the subsidy of \$100,000 and in 1913 he was on the delegation which obtained important telegraphic and fishing concessions. Senator McLean is one of the ablest and most fervent speakers in the province and has been in great demand especially in election campaigns. The Guardian extends its congratulations and those of its many readers to Senator McLean on his well deserved promotion.
