MOTORCYCLES LEAD TRUCKS IN DASH TO FIGHT FIRES

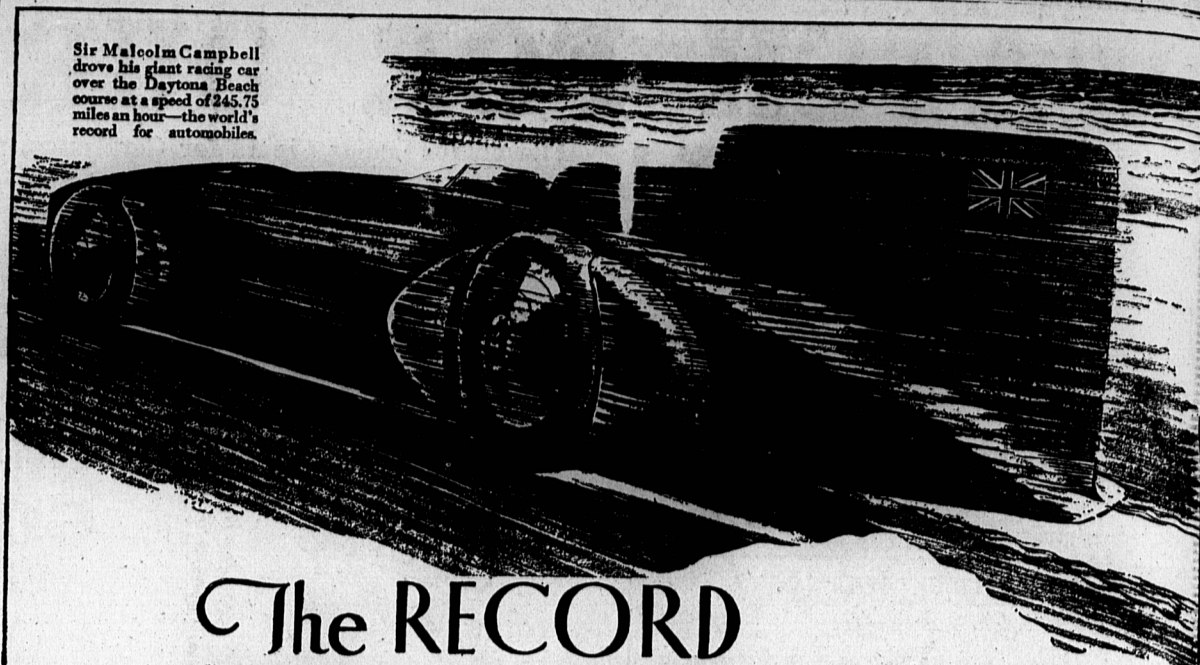

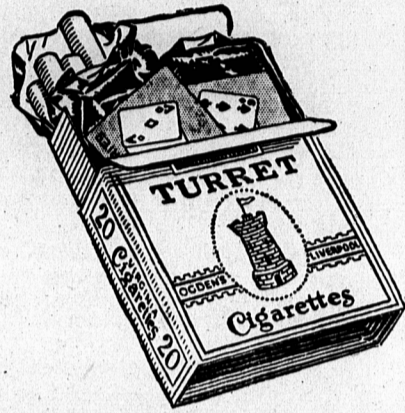
