Chief Justice Sullivan will preside at the June term of the Supreme Court which opens in Summerside today. The Charlottetown Guardian is the only Prince Edward Island newspaper that places its circulation figures before the public. The sad news was received in this City yesterday by telegram that Mrs. William Stutson, who had been seriously ill in Boston, and to whose bedside Mr. Bruce had gone some days ago, had died on Sunday evening. There were no further particulars. In connection with the bicycle road race to take place this summer, the Guardian Cup, the Prowse Bros., Ltd., medal, the Miller medal, and Pasterson medal, the announcement is made that a handsome silver trophy in the form of a substantial butter cooler will also be presented by the Canadian Cycle and Motor Co., through their local representative for the City, Ernest Rice.

Twelve entries had been received at the Charlottetown office last night for the seven mile road race promoted by Dr. Ledwell, W. P. Boggs, and R. H. Sterns, to be run on the 22nd inst. These comprise some of the most promising men in the athletic field and some runners from whom a good account is expected on the day of the race. There are probably half a dozen more entries to be made, and the gentlemen who have been the prime movers in this contest have concluded to keep the date for receiving entries open for a day or two in order that the field may be filled with such competitors as to make the race a memorable one. The list of entries will be given to the public as soon as possible.

The Executive Committee of the P. E. Island Development and Tourist Association met last night in the Mayor's Office. There was a large attendance, and an animated and business-like discussion of the affairs of the Association. There has been a good deal of quiet but effective following-up advertising done in the wake of the publicity of the past two years, and the results of the good work that has been accomplished are evident in the enquiries that have been and are now being received from prospective tourists to this Province. There is to be a meeting of the Executive on Monday night in the Mayor's office and on Tuesday night the annual meeting of the Association will be held in the Board of Trade Rooms. Members will be called on this week to contribute their dues. The visit of the Rev. Edwin Smith on a lecturing tour this spring under the auspices of the association was productive of much good, as he undoubtedly by means of his illustrated lectures did a good deal to advertise the province to the people of the New England cities which he visited. There have been a number of letters received from different persons asking for information about the Province, and some parties wishing to tour in automobiles have written for particulars. The great interest shown in his Province by the people abroad has led the Executive of the Tourist Association to seriously consider an advanced step for the handling of the tourist trade this summer.

The people of Union Vale and C'Leary was shocked on Tuesday morning the 4th inst. when the news was learned of the death of Charles Dunn in the 69th year of his age. "Dad" had been a sufferer from asthmatic troubles for quite a number of years but at no time during his untimely illness was his death so anticipated for as on this occasion. He contracted a cold a week previous to his death which later developed into pneumonia, and despite all that medical aid and all the care that kind and loving hands could bestow, death came at an early hour to relieve him of his sufferings. The deceased was noted for his sterling integrity and characterized by his unflinching benevolence to those in want and distress. In time of sickness or trouble he was always found to the fore assisting and helping those afflicted. His familiar figure together with his many good deeds and acts of kindness will be long remembered by the residents of this locality with whom he has resided for upwards of forty years. He was one of the first pioneers of the place and by hard work and industry had helped to make Union Vale what it is today, one of the most thriving settlements on the Island. He leaves a sorrowing widow, four sons and four daughters to mourn the loss of an affectionate husband and father. His funeral took place on Friday morning to the Roman Catholic Church Bolefield and was largely attended. A solemn requiem high mass was celebrated by the pastor Rev. F. X. Gallant after which all that was mortal of a just and upright man was laid to rest in the adjoining cemetery there to await the resurrection morn. The pall bearers were Patrick Roney, Thomas Daniels, Thomas E. Hogan, John Gaid, James Corcoran and James R. Stewart.—Com.

"Ranging Duke" has proved himself a first class stock horse before leaving England as it can be seen he traces back to old William the Conqueror the foundation of all shire horses. He won several prizes in the old country and has been already shown in Canada at Toronto in February of this year (1907) and won second prize in a large field of horses.
