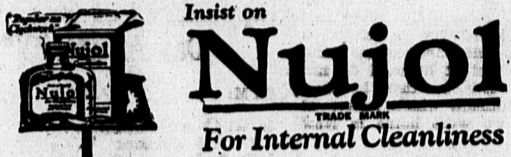

JUVENILE COURT.—The last issue of the Canada Gazette contains a proclamation bringing into force the Juvenile Delinquents Act in the Town of Summerside, P.E.I. The act provides for a system similar to that in force in Great Britain, Australia, the United States and Sweden and is based on the following principles: (1) That probation is the only effective method of dealing with youthful offenders; (2) That children are children even when they break the law and should be treated as such and not as adult criminals. A child under the act means a boy or a girl, under the age of 16 years. When this court is fully established any child under the age of 16 years when arrested, instead of being taken before the magistrate, shall be taken before the Juvenile Court. This act, it is understood, was brought into force through the efforts of the children's Aid Society of Prince County.

Uigg And Grand View Shipping Club

The Uigg and Grandview shipping club organized Jan. 1924 closed their first year's operations at their Annual Meeting on Jan. 24th. The financial statement of the shipping of lambs and live hogs, carried on in co-operation with the Federal shipping club, Eldon, showed a successful year's business. At the first annual meeting of the club largely attended by the farmers of Uigg and surrounding vicinities, a pleased and optimistic spirit was apparent with regard to their first endeavors, in co-operative shipping. A number of resolutions were passed to insure a more successful management of future shipments and increased volume of business.

President W. B. Scott who presided at the meeting expressed the ideals and aspirations of members of the club in the following address: "At the first annual meeting of our shipping club we wish to thank our members for their loyalty and faithful support of our co-operative shipping venture. We wish especially to thank those who helped in organization and contributed toward our first shipment. We have sent off altogether six shipments of hogs and one of lambs which have netted satisfactory returns. Co-operative shipments of farm products and especially of live stock is still in its infancy. Our first co-operative venture, the egg circle, organized in 1912 has met with unusual success. The members of egg circles realize now that the co-operative handling of eggs, stands for "protection" in which the non members share as well as patrons.

What is true of the egg circles is also true of shipping clubs. The members should consider and appreciate the "protection" which cannot very well be computed in

dollars and cents but at the same time really exists.

In the short time we have been organized as a shipping club our influence has been felt and our importance has gone abroad. This is proved by the fact that we are in a position not to accept unconditionally any offer made us. At the different meetings held during the past year we have passed resolutions which were for the good of the club. These resolutions we should reconsider and adopt others which may be necessary to assure us a more successful year. I would like to bring to the notice of the members the educational value of our club. Through the Live Stock Branch we are kept in touch not only with local markets but also with Montreal markets which practically rules the Dominion. Our opportunities of getting higher values are much improved by shipping through our club as we are in a position to sell in either markets. One of the essentials of being a good member is in attending all meetings whether we have hogs to ship or not. We should endeavor to cultivate as far as possible a class spirit and feel that we are brother farmers with the same interests and objectives. Lastly we wish to thank the members of the Federal Shipping Club, Eldon for the unselfish and faithful way they have helped in our shipments and made possible the success resulting from our combined efforts.

The President's address was followed by the financial report of the Secretary W. D. Ross proving the advantage of selling hogs on the graded basis demonstrated by figures actual gains on all shipments ranging from 40 to 116 dollars per shipment. A summary of the secretary's report is given as follows:

The club organized seven shipments six of hogs and one of lambs. Three of these shipments were consigned to Mitchell & Mahar, Montreal, three to Davis & Fraser, Charlottetown, one to W. Davies & Co., Montreal. In all shipments there were sold 661 hogs and 324 lambs realizing to the 60 shippers participating \$12,712.11.

The expenses of loading, feed, man in charge, etc., was \$489, which represent a further sum divided among farmers of the community. A total gain of \$489.65 was made on all shipments over flat rates. This gain was not made by inflated markets but rather on markets that were weak or lowering. Much of the gain is due to the number of bacon type hogs produced in the districts shipping, the club holding the honor of sending to Montreal the highest graded car of selects from the Maritime Provinces. The total number of selects out of 661 hogs was 314 or 50% nearly. As farmers we cannot overestimate the value of the work carried on by Mr. A. W. Peterson and Mr. H. Clay of the Live Stock Branch. Through their efforts this club was organized which closed its year's work with such beneficial results. Taking into consideration that other clubs made equal or better gains should convince the farmers of this Province the advantages of shipping on a graded basis over the old system.

Any body of farmers wishing to organize will find in Mr. Peterson and Mr. Clay ready and willing helpers.

On Saturday death called one of New Glasgow's best known citizens when Mr. Alexander A. Clay received the final call.

He was in poor health for many years suffering from Pernicious Anaemia, and although at times seemed to make improvement, yet suffered much and death brought a merciful release from pain.

There was perhaps no man better known in the community than Mr. Clay. He was born in Bedouque, Prince Edward Island, in 1857, and came to New Glasgow in 1899. He conducted a grocery store for many years on the stand now occupied by ex-Mayor George White, and there he did a large business. He was known for his honesty and integrity, and had the respect and esteem of the citizens.

Some ten years ago he was in the Customs service, but for the last five years had been quite ill and unable to attend to the duties of his office.

Those who knew the late Mr. Clay best were most appreciative of his many fine qualities, and the community generally sincerely mourns his passing.

A member of First Presbyterian Church he was very much interested in the church.
