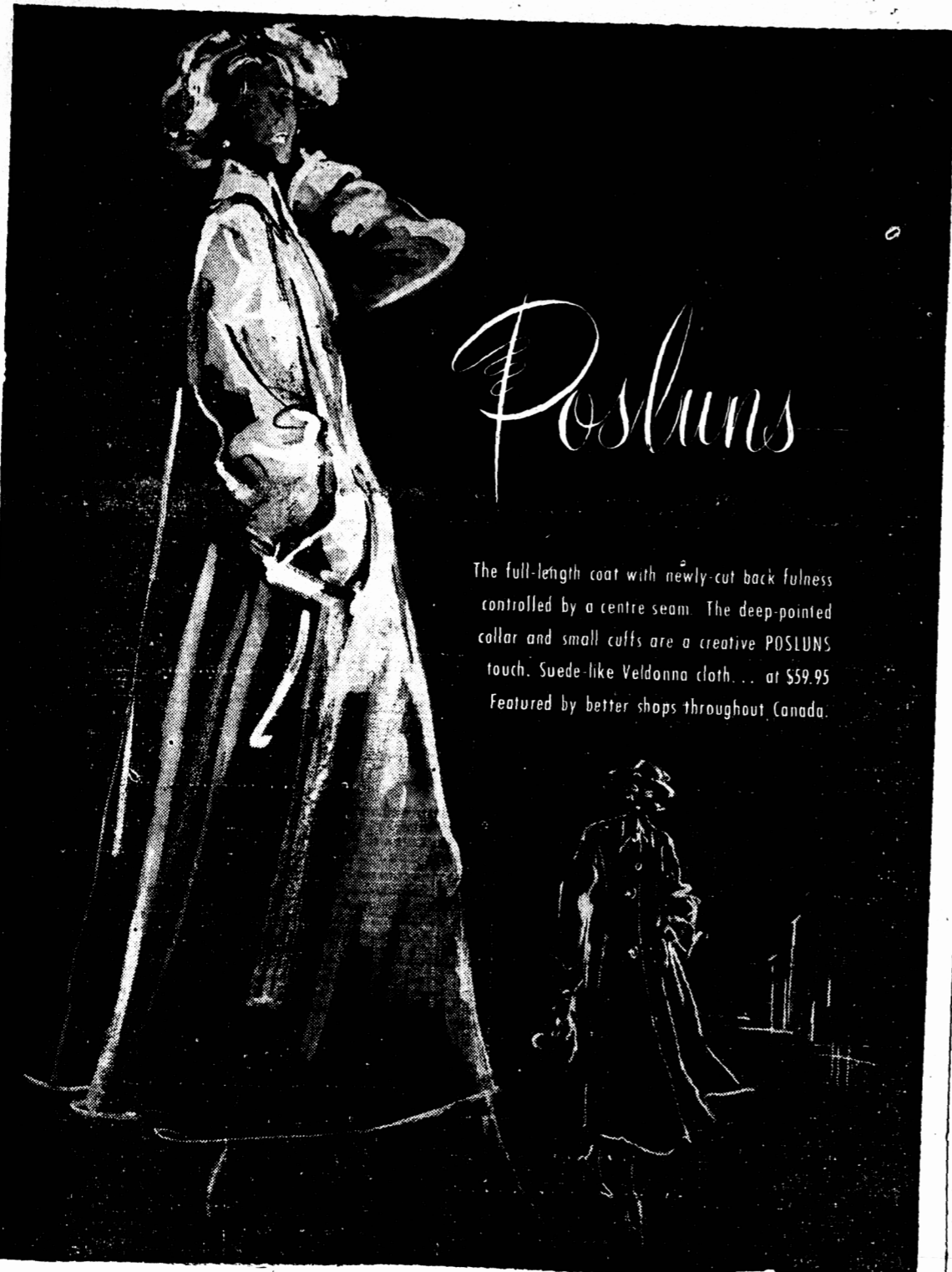

IN MEMORIAM

HARRY ALONZO PATTERSON
Cape Traverse and surrounding districts were shocked and saddened on Tuesday, Sept. 14th, when word was received that Harry Alonzo, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Patterson, had been accidentally killed while working on the electric light line near Albany Village. Alonzo was born Feb. 9, 1927. He was a young, forgiving, full of life and fun, yet he had his serious thoughts and ways. He ever strove to follow in the footsteps of his father. His delight was to visit the aged, the sick, and sorrowing ones, especially in hospitals, where he spent so many of his leisure hours, and where so many of the patients learned to love him and watch for his coming. His was the religion of which James in his epistle wrote, "True Vengeance and Anger be left to God and the Father. It is this, to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction and to keep himself unspotted from the world."

During the last war Alonzo volunteered to fight for his country. He was accepted but on account of being so young he was not permitted to serve overseas, but faithfully served in different parts of Canada until the war was over.

When he came home he went to work with the Maritime Electric Co. in Charlottetown with whom he was working at the time of his death.

His funeral, which was one of the largest ever seen in Cape Traverse, took place Thursday, Sept. 16th. The service at the home was conducted by the Rev. Horace MacQueen. The Pains sung were the 23rd, 121st, and the 122nd. The service at the graveside was under the direction of the Knights of Pythias, Charlottetown, which lodge Alonzo was a member. Members of the Knights of Pythias, a large delegation of firemen and members of the Maritime Electric staff and the pallbearers marched in front of the hearse from the home to the grave. Following the hearse were about eighty cars. Burial was in the Church of Scotland burial ground at Cape Traverse.

The pallbearers were Messrs. Cedric Campbell, Vito Norring, Edwin Crossman, Russell Quigley, Raymond Morrison and Gerald MacFadyen.

The morning of Alonzo's death his mother had left to accompany her brother, Mr. William Pye, Cape Traverse, to Boston, Mass., to attend the funeral of his son. Wilfred, who only the day before had passed away. She received the sad news of Alonzo's death while in Amherst, and accompanied by her son Lester and his wife returned home Tuesday in the midst of life we are in death. 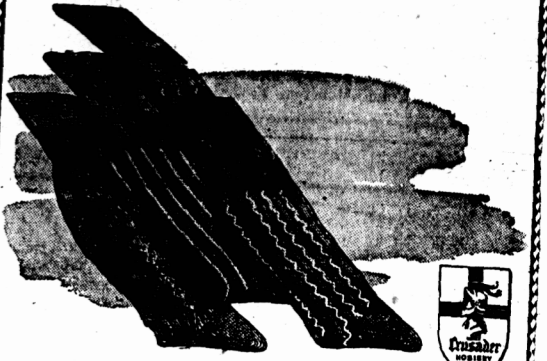
Messrs. Lord and Howatt of Carleton (well known produce shippers) have shipped several carloads of potatoes from this point in the past few weeks.
