#### STANDARDIZED DRESS FOR BUSINESS GIRLS

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—With a solemn warning to make designers of feminine finery that they "sit up and take notice," 500 Napoleonic-ettes of the commercial world, members of the Professional and Business Women's League, are preparing to stage a fashion show at the Commodore Hotel, Sept. 18-23.

This purpose, they say, is to point out to the business flapper the incongruities in her get-up; to bring about a closer affinity between beauty and the working girl, and, most important of all, to impress upon male architects of female fashions the imperative need for a standardized attire for business women only.

To date the male designer has confined himself to thinking up novel effects for the "frivolous flapper, the delirious debutante, the society matron, globe trotter, dancing girl, beach beauty, tennis devotee, Dian of the hunt and lassie of the niblick," says the fashion show promoters.

Torn between her desire to dress as well as any of these, and with no accredited pattern book to clip, the "business flapper" has been evolved. "She doesn't dress the way she does because she enjoys being the butt of the chorists and cynics, but simply because she loves beauty and wants to express it in the only way she can—through her clothes."

The desire to uplift anybody or anything is entirely lacking in the style show.

"Nothing is further from our purpose," asserted Mrs. Caroline Radner Lewis, advertising manager for a silk manufacturer, and Mrs. L. M. Russell, a magazine editor. "Business women do not require uplifting; they have done and will continue to do this for themselves."

Of course, despite the necessity for such a fashion show, "the American business woman is the best dressed woman on earth. But the business caper is not to be classed as a business woman; she is rather, one in the making."

#### Funeral of the Late Mr. P. Burlington

The funeral of the late Mr. Percy Burlington took place on Sunday afternoon from the Union church, of which the deceased had been for many years a member and faithful attendant. The service was impressive throughout, and the numerous concourse of citizens in attendance attested the esteem in which the late Mr. Burlington was held and was expressive of the widespread sympathy felt for his bereaved relatives, especially for his parents and little son.

At the graveside, after a brief prayer, by Mr. Sarkissian, the burial service was in charge of the Oddfellows. The beautiful ritual of the Order was conducted by Acting Noble Grand Black and Past Grand Dr. Bayne—the latter in the capacity of Chaplain. After the burial the Oddfellows returned to their Lodge Room where resolutions of condolence were passed to the relatives and thanks tendered to the Band. Brief addresses bearing testimony to the high character of the late Brother Burlington, as an Oddfellow and a man, were given by acting Noble Grand Black, Brothers Bayne, Crosby, Lichstone and others.

#### MASKED WOMEN FLOG ONE OF SEX

FORT WORTH, Tex., Sept. 20.—Mrs. I. A. Tatum, aged forty-four, was reported in a serious condition today as the result of a flogging administered last night by four women, one of them masked, who described themselves as a committee of the "Ladies of the Invisible Eye." Mrs. Tatum, who received 100 lashes, it is said was accused of mistreating her daughter.

The women, who announced themselves as members of a secret society, enticed Mrs. Tatum into an automobile by promising to take her to her daughter. The car was then driven six miles from her home at Stop Six, Dallas Pike, where her assailants, she said, applied straps with balls fastened to the end.

According to Mrs. Floyd, aunt of the victim Mrs. Tatum's body was a mass of bruises. Mrs. Floyd said that Mrs. Tatum believed she could recognize two of her abductors. No threats had been received by Mrs. Tatum, Mrs. Floyd said, but she added that the women who whipped Mrs. Tatum said they were from Dallas. They accused Mrs. Tatum of mistreating her daughter and said county authorities could do nothing to them.

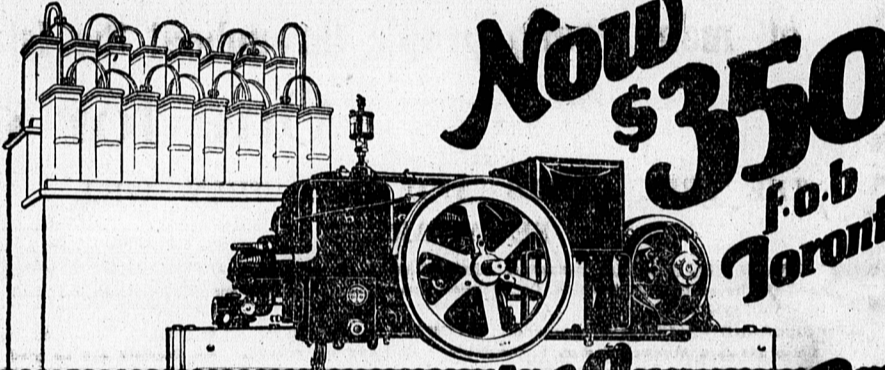
