Through The Looking Glass

EMPIRE DAY

I like to talk to the Philosopher when he is working in his garden. For as he turns over the rich, dark earth with his spade, he is proud, mentally, the fertile soil of his mind. Because he has a taste for the vegetable gardens should be planted, with the exception of tender seedlings and later plantings of certain vegetables, the 24th of May. I was not surprised, when I strolled over one morning, to find him busy with spade and hoe. Already, neat rows of early lettuce, radish and peas were pushing well out of the ground, and I knew it would not be long until the salad of the first two would appear at my door with the "compliments of the Philosopher."

He asked me rather bluntly, when he caught sight of me, if I intended to plant a tree, Empire Day. He wished, he said, that every man, woman and child in the Dominion of Canada would set out a shrub, or a tree—ornamental or fruit,—on that day.

When one travels over this country, he waves his arm in the direction of the four winds, and is amazed at the dearth of fine shade trees and shrubbery. There are scores of homes which are crying to break the bleakness of their landscape save the cows and the hens which peep at all the way from the kitchen door to the window. I wonder why it is so?

The philosopher leaned thoughtfully on his spade, "The woods and the swamps are full of small saplings of our beautiful Canadian trees, which, if transplanted would, in time, beautify the grounds of any home."

Perhaps education is needed along that line, if it is to be of any use. "And education begins with the child," said the philosopher, "So we have Empire Day, the 24th of May, founded by a woman, way back in 1897. Arbor Day, we used to call it. Years ago the day meant little more than a general tidy-up of the school yard, but now its theme, as its Founder intended, is Patriotism, and its aspirant children with the higher ideals of citizenship and patriotism."

"Not a bad one," commented, "In this day of arms and ammunition, 'A splendid one,' said the philosopher, 'For young and old. If there is one thing that should be instilled in the minds of people, today, it is the truth that we must put something worth while into life if we or posterity are to reap something worth while from it. We can reap for a time, 'tis true, from our rich heritage, much as we reaped from our farming lands. But alas! we stripped them too often of their fertility. How much nobler of us, if we in the words of Lord Tweedsmuir's Coronation Day speech: 'Pay our debt to the past by putting the future in debt to us. In this great land of Canada we have an immense debt to pay to our pioneer forefathers, since no finer heritage than ours has ever been passed to any people. I think we can pay it if we interpret Patriotism in the way it was interpreted, many years ago, by a man named, Henry Gillet. 'It should be,' said he, 'the work of a genuine patriot to endeavor to raise the life of the nation to the level of its privileges; to harmonize its general principles with its abstract principles; to reduce to actual facts the ideals of its institutions; to elevate instruction into knowledge; to deepen knowledge into wisdom; to render knowledge and wisdom complete in righteousness, and to make the love of country perfect in the love of man.'"

"And that brings us back to the point," I remarked. "That on Empire Day we must plant trees and shrubs in the ground, if we want beauty without; and the ideals of citizenship in the mind of man if we want beauty and peace within." Said the Philosopher with a humorous smile as he went on with his spading.
