COLD STORAGE, PACKING AND CANNING

Some weeks ago a good deal of attention was attracted here by the announcement that the Provincial Government had entered into an agreement on rather remarkable terms with a number of prominent capitalists who were to establish extensive meat-packing, cold storage and fruit and fish-canning establishments in this and other Provinces.

An Ottawa telegram of Sept. 22nd contains the following which we infer is the company referred to: The Dominion Packing Company, consisting of R. D. McGibbo, K. C.; T. Chase Casgrain, K. C.; Edouard Fabre, Surveyor, Douglas Armour, and Montague Miller, all of Montreal, has been incorporated by letters patent, with a capital stock of \$1,000,000.

Elsewhere in this issue appears the advertisement of Messrs. Davis & Fraser of Halifax, a well-known firm which has had considerable business with the Island in the past. This firm has now made a proposition to the Provincial Government. The nature of their proposal is stated in another column, and is in several respects much more favorable on its terms than that said to have been agreed upon with the company of capitalists first above referred to.

No one will underrate the importance of the new packing, canning and cold storage improvements that are proposed. There is a general conviction that they are necessary and that we must have them before long. But the matter of terms and conditions is almost equally vital, and especially is it desirable that the Province shall not be subjected to fresh liabilities of uncertain magnitude where our financial resources are so limited and where no new sources of public revenue are likely to be opened up.

Capt. Bernier proposes to discover the North pole and place the Canadian flag there if he can get money enough to equip his expedition. His plan is original. He will make his start from the west through Behring Sea and Strait and drift with the current through the Arctic Sea along the northern coast or North America. This plan has been strongly endorsed by scientific men and skilled arctic navigators. As to the money required Capt. Bernier has already spent five years in the effort to raise it. He wants \$150,000. The Dominion Government has promised him \$60,000 in case he secures the balance elsewhere, and the captain has had promises of \$15,000 each from the Governments of Ontario and Quebec. These sums, if paid over, would bring the fund up to \$90,000, and \$30,000, which has been secured from the private sources, would enlarge the total to \$120,000. In other words he has 20 per cent of the required amount pledged, and needs 20 per cent more, or \$30,000. Lord Strathcona has pledged \$5,000 towards this object; and the Toronto World proposes that six other wealthy Canadians shall give \$5,000 each, or that twelve shall give \$2,500 each to make good the required amount. It would be a fine advertisement for Canada should Capt. Bernier succeed.

THE BODIES RECOVERED. LONDON, Sept. 23.—A despatch from Inverlaken says the bodies of M. Faron, one of the French tourists and a guide Fritz Bohren, who fell into a crevasse, on Sunday, while attempting to climb Mount Blanc, have been recovered, in the upper Couliir, by Gottfried Bohren, a brother to the guide.

GOING TO WASHINGTON. OTTAWA, September 23.—The removal from Ottawa to Washington of Monsignor Falconi, apostolic delegate of the Holy Roman See in Canada, is generally accepted among the clergy as certain, and there is considerable speculation as to his probable successor.

TORONTO PREPARES FOR COAL FAMINE.

Toronto, Sept. 23.—Mayor Howland is negotiating with the Dominion Coal Company with the view of bringing soft coal to Toronto before the close of navigation, so as to check the price of fuel in case the anthracite strike continues during the autumn. City dealers have no hard coal for sale.

ST. THOMAS STREET CARS.

St. THOMAS, Ont., Sept. 23.—For the past 10 days a single street car has been running on Talbot street, and to the railway station. Today the solitary car was sent to the barn and busses called into requisition. The tie up is due to the railway company failing to pay the St. Thomas Gas & Power Company for power supplied.

SIR CHARLES TUPPER.

OTTAWA, September 23.—Sir Charles Tupper left to-day for Vancouver, where he will remain for a short time and afterwards he will return to Winnipeg to spend the winter with his eldest son Stewart Tupper.

It is likely that Ottawa will soon have a new up-to-date hotel on the old site of the Hotel Cecil.

SENTENCED FOR STEALING.

SYDNEY, September 23.—Fred Campbell and George McIsaac were sentenced to serve two years each in D'Arche's penitentiary by Judge Dodd this morning. Campbell pleaded guilty to stealing, and McIsaac to receiving stolen goods. Both Campbell and McIsaac belong to Dominion, where the stealing was committed.

CONFESSED TO KILLING.

CLARK-BURG, W. Va., Sept. 23.—In the Circuit Court here, yesterday, former Assistant Fire Chief William Rogers confessed to shooting and killing Chief of Police Childers, a few weeks ago.

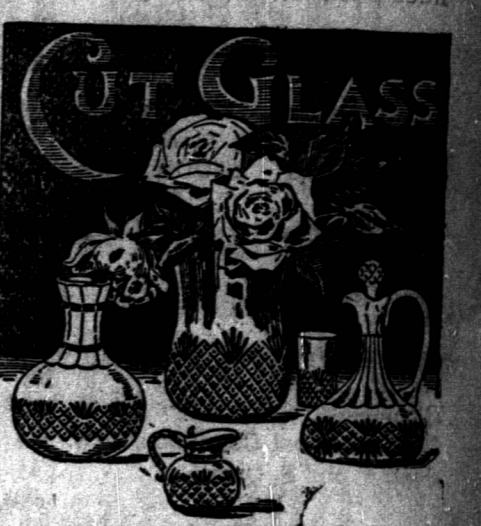
