LORD BYNG USED COMMON SENSE

London Times Justifies Gov.-General's Decision - No Interference From Downing Street.

LONDON, July 6. — Editorially discussing the constitutional aspects in Canada, the London Times says specifically that Lord Byng did not seek advice of Downing Street.

"In the whole of this crisis," it says, "in the refusal of dissolution to the leader of one party and the granting of it to the leader of the other, the Governor-General of the Dominion appears to have acted as he was right in acting, solely on his personal advisers. It is a fact that he did not consult the British Government, and that they have made no attempt whatever to interfere with or influence his action. Any such attempt would, of course, have constituted a highly improper encroachment on his functions as the constitutional representative of a constitutional monarchy.

Free Press Comments On Borden's Return to Politics

(Special to the Guardian) WINNIPEG, Man., July 6.—Under the heading, "Sir Robert Borden to Re-enter Politics," the Free Press this morning says editorially: "Many Canadians will regret the return of Sir Robert to the turmoil of political life after the part which he played during the war as prime minister during the whole of that momentous period. His health was sorely impaired by the heavy responsibilities of that time, and by Canadians in general he has been held in high regard, but no one would expect that feeling to remain the same if he is induced to actively identify himself with the Conservative party again in order to aid Mr. Meighen in a difficult election contest. It is fairly safe to say that most Canadians would have preferred that the last remembrance of Sir Robert's public career should have been his service as Canada's war premier and in such capacities as that which he filled as our chief representative at the framing of the peace of Versailles and at the disarmament conference at Washington. It was as a result of the denial of the principle of equality in respect to the right of Canada of the old colonial right, that Mr. Meighen became Prime Minister. How then can Sir Robert Borden accept a place in a government which has no right to exist unless we throw overboard the principle for which he fought on various occasions during and after the war."

Col. Lennox Summoned to The Capital

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, July 6.—Colonel Herb Lennox, Conservative member for North York in the last parliament, returned to Ottawa last night at the request of Premier Arthur Meighen in view of the fact that Mr. Meighen is at present engaged in forming an administration. Colonel Lennox's summons to the capital aroused considerable interest in local political circles.

Government Motion Carried 181 to 64

(Canadian Press) LONDON, July 6.—The House of Commons sat until nearly 11 o'clock this morning discussing the government's motion to continue the emergency regulations which were made effective at the beginning of the coal strike under the Emergency Powers Act of 1920. Motion was carried 181 to 64.

Lapointe's Services To Be Rewarded

MONTREAL, July 6.—La Devoir the organ of the Bonaparte cartage, has the following special despatch from Ottawa: "A Liberal committee is at present organizing a subscription for Mr. Ernest Lapointe, in recognition of his services rendered to the party at the beginning of the session when Mr. King was unable to be present in the House, it is desired to offer Mr. Lapointe a purse of \$10,000. Lawrence A. Wilson (the former member for Yandreuil-Soulanges) is said to have already subscribed \$25,000, and another prominent Toronto Liberal a sum of \$20,000. The remainder of the amount will be subscribed by the Liberal members of the House of Commons. "The committee recalls that subscriptions of this nature have already been made on behalf of Sir John A. MacDonald of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and Mr. Fielding."

ANNUAL MEETING LAST NIGHT OF P. E. I. ORPHANAGE

Splendid and Comprehensive Reviews of Year's Work In Different Departments—Interesting Discussion on Matters Pertaining The Institution—Election of Trustee Board.

The annual meeting of the contributors to the Prince Edward Island Protestant Orphanage was held last evening in Zion Church schoolroom, with Col. D. A. MacKinnon, Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the chair, and a large number of citizens present. The minutes of the previous meetings were read by the Secretary, Mr. Ira M. Brown, and adopted.

Review of Year's Work

The report submitted by the Trustee Board was as follows: At the opening of 1925 the first payment of our Debt Limiting Campaign was almost completed. The debt had previous to this payment reached the sum of \$40,000. The Campaign Treasurer, Mr. R. H. Jenkins, M.P., who is also Treasurer of the fund, has given a great deal of his time and attention to the work. At the beginning of 1925 Mr. Donald McKinnon, K.C., was Chairman of the Board of Trustees, which was then composed of seventeen members, and the maintenance of the institution was entirely in the hands of the Ladies' Auxiliary.
