STONED THE POLICE

Troops Called Out Fire Three Volleys Killing and Wounding Many.

RUSSIAN RIOTERS STONE THE POLICE.
ST. PETERSBURG, May 22.—(Special)—A despatch of the 21st says the strikers at Abuchoff Iron Works with Alex Androvsky had a collision with the authorities. On Monday some 3,500 of the rioters stoned the police, injuring 12.
SOLDIERS FIRE ON THE RIOTERS.
The police were then reinforced by the soldiers who fired three volleys. Two men were killed outright, seven wounded and 120 persons arrested.

BOTH WERE DISABLED.

New Shamrock Nearly Wrecked—King Edward Saw the Disaster.

SHAMROCKS STRUCK BY A SQUALL.
LONDON, May 22.—(Special)—During the race between the two Shamrocks and the Synaria in the Solent to-day a sudden squall struck the yachts.
The topmast of the Shamrock II was carried away and the mainmast went by the board, carrying all sails with it leaving her partially a wreck.
The topmast of the Shamrock I was also carried away.
KING EDWARD WAS PRESENT.
No one was injured on the yacht. The disaster which caused great excitement was witnessed by King Edward, who was the guest of Sir Thomas Lipton on the Erin at the time.

GOVERNOR HOWLAN'S

Will and Testament Probated Yesterday

VARIOUS BEQUESTS

And Legacies—The Inventory With the Names of the Executors.

The last will and testament of the late Lieut. Governor Howlan probated yesterday at noon:
I desire to be buried in the family plot in the grave yard of the Tignish church.
After payment of my just debts funeral and testamentary expenses my wish is that my executors erect in said plot a suitable monument to my memory.
I devise to my executors hereafter named their heirs and assigns as joint tenants that plot of land in the town of Tignish aforesaid, now held by F. J. Buote subject to an agreement for the purchase of the same by him from me for \$100, payable at the rate of six dollars (\$3.00) a year as set out in the agreement. My will is that my executors receive payment of the price from time to time under such agreement and devote such annual or other payments of six dollars a year from year to year to painting the railing around the graves in said plot and preserving and keeping clean the grass and monuments therein as far as the money will extend. On payment of the price the executors their heirs and assigns. If F. J. Buote makes default in payment my executors their heirs and assigns to have a full power to enforce the agreement, and pursue all remedies for non-fulfillment thereof that I myself could have or take if living.
I give my watch and all my books to my nephew, J. George Howlan MacGillivray at present of No. 32 Grove Street, Chelsea, Mass., U. S.
I devise to my executors their heirs and assigns as joint tenants my land and property at Watermere, Charlottetown, to be sold by them at the best price that can reasonably be obtained and the proceeds be held by them as part of the personal estate that properly may be sold on terms of part of the purchase money remaining unpaid on the security of the property for such time, at such interest and on such terms as my executors their heirs and assigns may agree on—the sum remaining unpaid to be covered by insurance on the building there effected and kept up at the expense of the purchaser.
I give my wife, Mary E. Howlan, five thousand dollars to be paid to her by my executors within twelve months after my decease the same to be in lieu and satisfaction of all her powers and claims of dowers in my lands everywhere.
(7) I give my said executors \$5,000 for the following purposes and on the following trusts that same they are to invest in their own name or in the name of the survivor of them in mortgages or freehold estate or in Canadian bonds or securities, or bonds or debentures of any province in Canada or any incorporated city in Canada and the interest of such investment they are to pay to my sister Miss Annie Howlan now residing at 32 Grove Street, Chelsea, Mass.

for the term of her natural life and my will is that such interest be paid to her monthly or as nearly monthly as the incoming of interest will admit of, the first payment to be made to her not later than two months after my decease. On her death all her doctor's bills, funeral and testamentary expenses and all charges incidental to her death and last illness in the discretion of my executors and the survivors of them, also the cost of a suitable monument to her memory to be erected wherever she may be buried shall be deducted from the said five thousand dollars and the net balance shall be equally divided between said nephew J. George Howlan MacGillivray and my niece Miss Julia MacGillivray now residing in Chelsea, Mass. If either of these my said nephew and niece should die in the life of my said sister the other to have the whole and if both of them should die in my said sister's lifetime of such net balance to be paid to the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Charlottetown as a contribution towards the furnishing of St. Dunstan's Cathedral, Charlottetown.

I also give the further sum of one thousand dollars \$1,000 to my executors to be by them invested in the same way as the money mentioned in the seventh paragraph and the principal and interest of which they shall hold for the purposes and on the trusts following: The interest of said one thousand dollars they are to pay annually or oftener in their discretion to Miss Annie Reddin, daughter of the late Judge Reddin during her natural life and at her death to pay the said one thousand to Miss Gladys Reddin, daughter of Dennis O'Meara Reddin, druggist.
I also give the further sum of one thousand dollars to my executors to be invested, the same as the money mentioned in the seventh paragraph and to be held by them for the purpose and on the trusts following the interest thereof to accumulate until Master George William Howlan Murphy, son of Dr. P. C. Murphy of Tignish reaches his eighteenth birthday and the said one thousand dollars and the accumulated interest to be paid to the said George W. H. Murphy's legal guardian for the sole use and benefit of said G. W. H. Murphy. My wish is that said G. W. H. Murphy be brought up in the legal profession to practise at the bar of P. E. Island, but the expression of this my wish is not to be a condition to the money mentioned in this paragraph being paid as aforesaid on his reaching the age of eighteen. Should the said G. W. H. Murphy die before reaching his eighteenth birthday the money mentioned in this paragraph shall form a part of my residuary estate.

I give to the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Charlottetown, the sum of one thousand dollars to be payable by my executors within twelve months after my death for the following purposes—in the first place to pay any debts that may be on the Roman Catholic Church, Alberton, at the time of my death, and if any balance thereof remain after payment of such debts such balance to be expended in beautifying said Church as the Lord Bishop of Charlottetown may desire.
If from any cause my estate should not be sufficient to pay all the legacies and bequests above mentioned, my will is that the provision for my sisters, and for my wife shall not in that event be lessened or abated, but shall be met and paid in full as hereinbefore specified, but in case of such deficiency the other legacies and bequests hereinbefore specified shall be proportionately lessened and the discretion of my executors as to the mode and manner of so lessening such of the other legacies and bequests shall be final.
I give to the person who shall be parish priest of Alberton at the time of my death one hundred dollars for masses for my soul. All the residue of my estate, real and personal whatsoever and wheresoever I give one half thereof to my said sister, and the other half in equal shares to my said nephew and niece.
I give my executors herein the sum of two hundred dollars each, the same to be in lieu of and satisfaction of all commission legally payable to them as executors. I appoint the Reverend A. E. Burke of Alberton and D. C. McLeod of Charlottetown Barristers-at-law my executors.

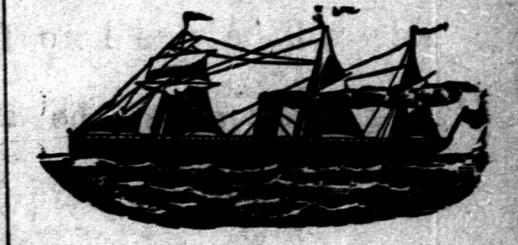
