Camp Brighton.

Second Annual Camp of the Charlottetown Boys' Brigade. Three Companies aggregating a hundred boys marched into camp on Wednesday last.

An army with banners may be a terrible thing; its antithesis in matters militant may be found in this battalion of stalwarts. While the former have as their ultimate object fierce and sanguinary strife, the latter have also warfare but of an ethical not sanguinary kind. Here springs fraternity, here is engendered discipline, a sense of responsibility too is inculcated while cleanliness is exacted to the last degree. Morning and evening prayers under the cerulean canopy take the place of those under the family roof. The drill hours are this year shortened, one at nine a. m., one at four either or both are cancelled if the heat is excessive. Bathing parades (at these an officer is always in charge), games of ball, football, etc., fill in the intervening hours.

Coronel Moore is Commandant, in itself a warrant that drill and hygiene are duly regarded.

Quarter Master Grey is indefatigable in his efforts to make the boys happy. In this he is ably seconded by Mrs. Grey. Doctor Johnson's position has so far been a sinecure. Chaplain Fullerton holds a dual position, that of Chaplain and also chairman of the sports committee. His ministrations in the first capacity have been appreciated; the boys are reverent in demeanor and his helpful and inspiring words have been matters of remark among the boys. In the sports he is in the best sense one of the boys, fertile in expedient for keeping them going and in good spirits.

Paymaster Miller's work, unthankful task in itself, finds its recompense in the help given to the boys and in the healthful holiday enjoyed by all ranks as a result of the canvass made by himself and Dr. Johnson for the sines of war.

Friday at the conclusion of the dinner a barouche containing Hon. Mr. Sutherland, Mr. Irray, Hon. D. A. McKinnon and Mr. Horace Hazard drove into the grounds. The acting commandant drew the battalion up in line and three rousing cheers with a tiger evidenced how much the boys appreciated the Government's kindness and Mr. McKinnon's kind offices in securing camp facilities. The boys were well prepared for their "Guard of Honor" to their Excellencies at the Tennis ground Saturday. To-day, Monday the Chaplain has invited the Brigade to a day's outing at Keppoch. The day of inspection has yet to be announced. King Sol has fairly beamed on the boys. All are well and heartily enjoying their Camp.
