WOMEN IN FIGHT TO SAVE TOWN

CORINNA, Me., Sept. 20—Five buildings on Maine street constituting one-fourth of the business section of this town, were destroyed by fire today, the loss being estimated at \$80,000.

For two hours it was feared that the entire centre of Corinna was doomed, but the citizens, aided by the fire-fighting companies from Dexter and Newport succeeded at length in subduing the flames, women and even children lugging water to the volunteer firemen.

The town loses one of its principal industries, Ireland Brothers' grist mill being one of the structures burned. Tonight the village is in darkness, as the electric lighting plant was burned.

GRIST MILL BURNED

The structures destroyed were: Ireland Brothers' grist mill, two storey wooden building, with a four storey elevator; loss \$30,000.

Two-storey wooden block owned by Irvin L. Jackson. The loss on the building is estimated at \$7000. The drug store of Dr. F. L. Redman in this building was ruined. Loss \$10,000.

General store owned by John Tricky in a two storey wooden building. Loss \$9000.

Two wooden residences owned by Frank Macumber. Loss \$4000.

The fire originated in the grist mill shortly after noon, and within a few moments the entire structure was ablaze. There was no one in the mill at the time, all the employees having gone home to dinner.

HAND TUB IS MANNED

A hand tub, the only piece of fire-fighting apparatus in town, was manned, but was unable to cope with the blaze.

Realizing they were handicapped by the lack of fire apparatus, town officials called on Newport and Dexter for aid, and men from those places soon were upon the scene.

Nearly all the citizens of the town and the outside help then attempted to confine the flames to the five burning buildings, and after two hours' hard work were successful.

The cause of the fire had not been determined definitely tonight. It is known to have started near a gasoline engine in the basement of the grist mill. The town's electric lighting plant was in the basement of the mill.

Corinna is a town of about 1300 population in Penobscot county, about 30 miles northwest of Bangor.

TRAGEDY IS A MYSTERY.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Sept. 21—A double tragedy which offers unusual elements of mystery is revealed on a little farm a few miles north of Minneapolis, in the cellar of the farmhouse, terribly beaten, investigators, last evening found the body of Mrs. Walter Bolton, wife of a bartender, while under a few inches of fresh earth, in the garden, was discovered the body of an unidentified man, Frank Rhodes, who has been employed on the farm, had not been seen for two or three days. SIR WILFRID WILL RESIGN HIS OFFICE VERY QUICKLY

Probably Fifteen Days Hence, Earl Grey May Remain to Await Events

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21—A great number of classic antiques, dating from the seventh century before Christ to the time of the Roman Empire, have already been unearthed by the American Archaeological Expedition exploring the ruins of Cyrene, in Northern Africa, which will soon resume its active operations under the sheltering influence of the United States Cruiser Chester.

A full report of the discoveries has just been received by the Archaeological Institute of America, with headquarters here, under whose auspices the excavations are being prosecuted. On the north west slope of the Acropolis of the ancient city a large number of votive offerings, mostly terra cotta, was found. Among the important discoveries were a marble head of Athena, the Grecian goddess of wisdom. It is one of the best period of Greek sculpture, a masterpiece of extraordinary beauty. A headless female figure of marble about six feet high, bearing a striking resemblance to the Nike of Samothrace, also was found under such conditions that the recovery of the head seems not impossible.

STRIKES CONTINUE IN MANY CITIES OF SPAIN

MADRID, September 21—The strikes in many cities of Spain continue, but the revolution seems to have been completely confounded by the prompt and energetic action of the government.

The postponement of the general strike is regarded as indicating that the backbone of the movement is broken.

The Government, while preparing to take the most drastic measures, does not lose sight of the democratic ideals which have inspired its program. Premier Canalejas declared last night martial law, notwithstanding the government would respect the right to strike if legally followed, but he gave fair warning that if the employees of the public services strike without giving previous notification, as required by law, the promptest measures would be taken to end the strike.

Other strikers, he added, who stepped outside the pale of the law would be mercilessly prosecuted, and at the slightest sign of revolt the troops would use their arms without hesitation. "All those who wish to demonstrate in the streets will have their chance tomorrow" said the Premier. "I am determined once for all to finish these mutterings of revolution."

So far as a censorship of great severity allows conditions to be known, there were no serious disorders in the provinces yesterday, most of the principal agitators were laid by the heels, or their actions were crippled effectively. Telegraphic and telephonic communication has been cut off from all suspected persons, including the republican and socialist leaders—Perez Cados, Pablo Iglesias and Pelez Aza—also are being closely shadowed by detectives.

House has been searched and arms seized and the prisoners are crowded with rioters and political suspects.

King Alfonso has announced his intention of remaining in Madrid until the crisis is over.

According to the official news received today the situation generally favors the government and the movement will be all over by Monday.

The only disturbance of the day in Madrid occurred while the police were searching the labor exchange. Several groups assembled outside protested against this measure and resisted the efforts of the police to disperse them.

The employees accepted a new wage rate schedule of 23 cents an hour for the first six months, 27 cents for the next year, and 29 cents thereafter. The rate was within a half cent of that originally demanded.

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 21—A number of persons were killed and wounded yesterday near Rio de Grigalva in an encounter between state troops and the rebellious Indians of Chihuahua, according to despatches received here. It was stated at the president's office that soldiers would be sent from the capital in the morning to Chihuahua.

NEW BRUNSWICK MAGNATE AFTER LOCAL PLUCK-CHASERS

MONTREAL, September 20—They may be booming hockey in the west, but they are not neglecting it in the east. Rollie Norman, from Montreal, who played with the all-Montreal and Cobalt teams, is in town having arisen from player to magnate, and, altho he will not admit it, is looking over the field for players for the coming maritime league.

Speaking to the Journal, he said: "We had a successful season last year, but we are going to have great or success this season. We will have a six or seven team league, and we have the cities Sidney, Glace Bay, North Sydney, New Glasgow, Stellarton, Halifax, Truro, Moncton and Amherst to choose from, Amherst, by the way, still being the stronghold of amateurism."

"Do you intend to pick up any players here or in Ottawa?" he was asked.

"Well," he replied, "I do not care to discuss that question just now, but we managed to draw from four to seven thousand people at times down here last year. We do not pay as much as some people perhaps, but if we did make any contracts here we would pay players if we really wanted to secure them."

Mr. Norman is due to stay here for a few days, and then make a trip to Ottawa.

N. Y. FIRE DEPARTMENT OFFICIAL BADLY INJURED

NEW YORK, September 21.—Groping his way on top of a burning building, Edward Atene, chief of the fire department, was badly injured by the dense smoke, walked off the edge of the roof and fell three stories to the ground. He will probably die.

ENQUIRY INTO THE OLYMPIC-HAWKE COLLISION

LONDON, September 21—A naval enquiry will be held at Portsmouth soon to fix the blame for the Hawke-Olympic accident. However, as was the case when the steamship First-class, with the British cruiser gladiator, the decision of the naval court will be withheld until the civil courts decide the question of damages as between the two vessels.

UNITED SHOE MACHINERY COMPANY INDICTED.

BOSTON, Mass., Sept. 21—An indictment was returned against the officers of the United Shoe Machinery Company and a second indictment was found against the company itself by the United States grand jury. The defendants are charged with conducting a business in restraint of trade.

The individuals indicted are President Sidney W. Winslow, Edward Hurd, George W. Brown, James J. Storrow, William Barber and Elmer H. Rowe, directors.

Both indictments charge the defendants with working through the instrumentality of the United Shoe Machinery Company, in a way to make them as individual criminally liable under the Sherman act.

The United Shoe Machinery Company has auxiliary companies in Canada, Great Britain, France, and Germany. It now employs 40,000 hands, who turn out 20,000 shoe machines yearly. The royalty system, by which the corporation disposes of its machines, allows a shoe manufacturer to lease machines, paying rentals in royalties on every shoe made. A manufacturer may buy machinery if he gets it from the United Shoe Machinery Company providing he buys his "findings" such as wire nails, and eyelets from the company. It is claimed that the royalty paid the United Company is about 2-3 cents per pair of shoes.

AMBITIOUS PROJECT OF DANISH AVIATOR.

NEW YORK, Sept. 22—The conquest of the Atlantic, the most ambitious exploit yet undertaken by an aviator is contemplated by a Danish aviator. He has enlisted the necessary financial aid and has made arrangements to fly next spring from Copenhagen to New York, resting on land at London and Queenstown and upon ships stationed at intervals across the North Sea and Atlantic Ocean.

EXPLOSION OF GASPIPE WAS FATAL

House Caught Fire And Four Persons Were Quickly Burned to Death

Special to The Guardian. YOUNGSTOWN, Sept. 22—At least four persons were burned to death and a dozen injured when an eight inch gas main burst and poured a stream of gas into a boarding house nearby. The building took fire and burned to the ground.

A GREAT IRISHMAN IS DEAD

LONDON, September 20—Sir Robert Hart, director general of customs in China from 1901 to 1908, and inspector-general since 1863, died today. Sir Robert had been living in England since his retirement from the Chinese service on account of ill health. Sir Robert Hart, who was an Irishman by birth, had been in the Chinese maritime customs service since 1859. He was born in 1835. The office of director-general of Chinese customs, inland as well as maritime, was bestowed upon him, together with other high honors, exceptional in the case of a foreigner, as a regard for services rendered the Chinese government in connection with the international settlement of the Boxer troubles.

Sir Robert Hart was the most potent link between China and the western world. He created the customs service, he gave China a comprehensive tariff, and was behind practically every commercial treaty that China made prior to 1908, when he returned to England on account of ill-health. Soon after his return he retired from the Chinese service.

He was secretary to the commission of the allies which met in Canton in 1858. He entered the Chinese customs service as deputy commissioner the next year. After being advanced to the post of an inspector-general of customs in 1863, he re-organized the service on modern lines. Chinese and Malay pirates at that time made Chinese waters unsafe to commerce. Hart equipped a large fleet of steamers to hunt the pirates down. He established lighthouses and later a postal service. In recognition of his important services he received the highest honors in the gift of the Chinese government.

C. P. R. STATION AT LAMBTON MILLS, ONT., BURGLARIZED

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 21—Burglars entered the Canadian Pacific station at Lambton Mills and took blank orders on the Dominion Express Company to the value of \$2,600. Besides the express orders some change and stamps, carrying away the till.

THE ARREST OF WORKINGMEN.

MADRID, September 20—The government, acting under the imperial decree of yesterday, suspending the constitutional guarantee because of revolutionary activity, has ordered the arrest of workingmen's committees and political agitators in the disturbed districts: 300 persons were imprisoned in this city last night.

Among those arrested here was Senor Largo Caballero, general counsel for and vice-president of the general union of labor. His offices were closed.

The general strike in this city called for today was prevented by the action of the authorities and the railway were running as usual. Thirty thousand men in the buildings trades received an order this afternoon to strike and it is believed that they may go out. The military is taking extreme precautions. Detachments of troops are stationed at the principal points of the city at railway stations, public buildings, schools, convents and markets. The military has taken into its keeping arms and ammunition of every description which were on sale. Complete quiet reigned in the capital today. Similar military measures have been taken in other cities. The whole army is under arms.
