The small coasting vessels are most all engaged bringing in oats from P. E. Island to supply the demand through the winter as the local supply is only small.—Sackville Post.

The Schooner Empress, Capt Murchison came into port yesterday morning after a third attempt during the past week to reach Gaspe all of which were futile owing to the strong contrary winds.

NOMINATIONS were made yesterday before Sheriff Wright, Macdonald and Maedona'd as intimated in yesterday's Guardian. The only member elected by acclamation were Hon. James Richards and A. J. Macdonald.

The fire brigade was called out yesterday evening shortly after five o'clock for a chimney blaze in the building on Great George Street occupied by McDonald & Perry, Daniel McLaren, merchant tailors and others. It was extinguished shortly.

THERE were six passengers in from Orwell by the City of London last evening. The cargo consisted of 48 bales hides 35 dressed hogs, 8 cases chickens, 3 cases eggs, 6 packages butter, 4 bags produce, 4 sacks wool and 1 seeding machine.

OWING to the threatening weather two vessels, one partly loaded, were towed down from Vernon River Bridge Tuesday evening by the William Aitkin. The river was filled with lolly and it looked threatening for loading vessels there for several days.

The minister of trade and commerce will recommend to his colleagues that the application of the Prince Edward Island Navigation Company for a ten year contract for the carriage of mails and passengers between the mainland and Prince Edward Island be granted. The Company's five year contract expires next year, but if they get a contract for a longer period the Princess will be replaced by a better vessel on the route between Pictou and Charlottetown.—St. John Telegraph.

Mr. Mackinnon will also place the same light in the Methodist church, Pownal. This is the first church in the Province to be lighted by this light.

FOUR cargoes of P. E. Island produce arrived yesterday, the schooner Una with 1055 bushels of oats, 2848 bushels of turnips, the schooner Vallant, 3900 bushels potatoes, 375 bushels of turnips and 1200 pounds pork, the schooner Kimberly, 1200 bushels potatoes, and the schooner D. T. Patchen, 900 bushels potatoes, 50 bushels oats.—Halifax Chronicle.

THE bar-keeper at George Essory's known letter as "Rory" from whom several witnesses at the Police Court last Monday swore they purchased liquor was arrested on a warrant last night by officers Kiggins and Harper. He will likely be tried today and the evidence given to exculpate Essory will be used against him. The bartender's second name is said to be Connolly and he hails from Pictou.

THERE was quite a lot of excitement over the nomination for the Georgetown district before Sheriff McDonald at Georgetown yesterday. It was thought by many of the Liberals that A. J. McDonald instead of J. A. Mathieson would be nominated against W. W. Jenkins and both parties deferred from placing their candidates in the field until the last moment. A large number of prominent politicians were in town.

The firemen have generously been donated by M. J. Haney the sum of \$25 in appreciation of their prompt and efficient services in connection with the fire on the Hillsboro Bridge tug W. F. McRae. This will be banked with other sums already received and will be used to form a fund to give aid to injured and disabled firemen. During the past year the Charlottetown firemen under Chief Ronahan and his assistants have reached a higher state of efficiency than ever before and the generous sums that have been presented them on a number of occasions show that the public appreciate their efforts.

The two men, Burns and Johnson, the former of whom claimed he was from Charlottetown who were arrested at New Annan, N. S. by Constable Wright, were arraigned before Stipendiary Crowe, at Truro Tuesday on a charge of larceny. The evidence of Constable Wright was taken and the prisoners remanded until Tuesday, December 6th. Detective Shaffington of Moncton and Policeman Jones, of Amherst, went to Truro to have a look at the prisoners, but neither of these officers were able to identify them. Constable Wright had both the prisoners photographed.

Louis and Fred Bennie and A. Matthews, Elmsdale are preparing to leave for Sydney, C. B. in a few days to resume work at the eel and small business which they have established at that place.

JOHN GARDNER, I. C. R., formerly of Albany, P. E. I. and brakeman at Truro, who was so badly injured at the railway panic last July is steadily improving; but will not be able to be out for some weeks yet. Mr. Gardner was able to dress himself for the first time on Sunday last.

A young man named Tommy Mallett, Elmsdale, met with a severe accident a few days ago. While chopping wood with a farmer at Lot 7 his axe slipped, inflicting a bad gash across his knee cap. Although medical aid was summoned, and everything possible is being done for the injured man, much fear is felt that blood poisoning will set in.
