### KILLING WEEDS.

Weeds should be killed just as the  
seeds are germinating, or while they  
are yet very small. When this is done  
but very little moisture is lost through  
them, and they render but little plant  
food insoluble. In the thorough and  
early preparation of the seed bed  
many weeds are destroyed by killing  
them just as they are coming up.

It is the same in the case of a grain  
field, which is rolled after being  
seeded, and is then harrowed; the  
rolling hastens the germination of the  
weed seeds, and the harrowing then  
throws them out into a dry soil, which  
kills them. If such a field is again  
harrowed just after the grain is up,  
a second crop of weeds may be de-  
stroyed and the yield made greater as  
a consequence.


In the case of potatoes and corn it  
is an easy thing to destroy at least  
two crops of weeds before the corn or  
potatoes are large enough to cultivate,  
by harrowing before and just after the  
plants are up. This is very important  
because if not only seven plant food  
for the crop, but it can be done so  
much more cheaply and rapidly with  
the broad light harrows and weeders  
than it can later with the cultivator.

### WOMEN'S WORK IN THIS TIME OF THE WAR

LONDON, March 7.—"Britons are coming slowly to a realization of the country's needs," declared Walter Hume Long President of the Local Government Board, in addressing the inaugural of the Women's National Land Service Corps which intends to undertake agricultural work during the absence at the front, or in the Government employ, of the men of the British Isles. Mr. Long declared that the Government required co-operation of all classes, and heartily approved of the women's movement which he said meant that women would now take even a larger share in the defence of the country.

"We want soldiers," said Mr. Long. "The movement means to have sufficient soldiers, and we are getting them. But we also want to keep the land cultivated and obtain a maximum output, so that we may assist our overseas trade and our imperial position. There is a wide field open for Women's activities. Women have proved themselves capable of work which before the war they were thought unfitted to perform, and it is the farmers' patriotic duty not to employ a single man who can be spared for a more important position."

The Government has announced its intention to employ a corps for the purpose of training women in agricultural purposes.

### LIEUT. CODERRE WAS 'REPRIEVED'

OTTAWA, March 9.—Hon. C. J. Doherty, Minister of Justice, has received a cable notifying him that the Home Secretary of the British Government had recommended to His Majesty the commutation of the capital sentence of Lieut. George Coderre, of the 41st Canadian Overseas Battalion. He was sentenced to death for the murder of Sergt. Ozanne, of the same battalion.

Lt. Coderre came from Sherbrooke, where his family are highly respected.

### SMOKING BY SOLDIERS IS BEING REGULATED.

TORONTO, March 9.—An order by Major-General Sir Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia, prohibiting the smoking of pipes, cigarettes or cigars in certain departments of the military service, has been received by the commanding officers of local units. The order prohibits smoking in business offices, store-rooms, mess-rooms or manufactory under the control of the Militia Department throughout Canada. Recreation, writing and similar rooms, including canteens, are not included in the order. The instruction has been issued as a precaution against fire, which might prove costly.

### RESPA DYNAMITER TO PRISON FOR LIFE

WINDSOR, Ont., March 7.—Charles Respa, coal-miner dynamiter of Windsor and Walkerville buildings, was found guilty of the charges and sentenced to life imprisonment by Chief Justice Falconbridge.
